

Raiders beat Dundas in overtime win 6-5

The Raiders found themselves another goaltender Friday night. They may now have the best one-two goaltending duo in the Georgian Bay Intermediate league.

Lloyd Vaughan, who replaced regular starter Peter McDuffe, proved himself convincingly to be a bona fide star in this league, leading the Raiders to a 6-5 overtime win over the second place Dundas Merchants. He was named the number one star of the game.

The praise for his efforts came from everyone in Gordon Alcott. The large crowd on hand offered many rounds of applause for his acrobatic style, which stymied the Merchants' players 37 of 42 times. Coach Steve Blundy quipped after the game, "where's he been hiding."

General manager Jack Handy added "McDuffe's job may be in jeopardy." McDuffe was out in Halifax with the American League Voyageurs as backup man for the Friday night game with Binghamton.

Vaughan, who hadn't played in over two years, looked sharp most of the game and aside from a few goals in the third period, when the defenseman in front of him eased up and forced him to go beyond the call of duty, he held the team in against a strong and determined fast, good skating opposition team. Dundas had been the league's winningest team of late.

KEY STOP

Several times he was call-

ed upon to make that key stop that set up a play leading to a Raider goal.

Needless to say, if one were at the game, his counterpart at the other end of the ice, Bob Sneddon, played a strong game also. He kept the Raider shooters firing shot after shot trying to find a hole in his big pads. Goal posts at both ends played key roles.

Gary Ford was the first Georgetown player to find the mark for the night. Just 33 second into the game he picked up a pass from Ray Tonelli, who got it from Bruce Ellison, to score. From that point the teams went all out in their efforts to win.

Gary Landry was next on

the scoresheet for Georgetown. His goal came 35 seconds later, when he beat Sneddon on passes from Juri Kudrasovs and Collin Gordon. Dundas came back for one at the midway point. Raider assistant captain Steve Lyons got the only goal of the second period, from captain Ray Tonelli and Ford.

In the third the Merchants outshot the Raiders 14-10, outscoring them three-two to force the overtime period. Their first goal came 14 seconds in. Bob Elinesky, with his first, from Rick Kessel and Steve Lyons and Tonelli from Ford were the only local goals the final 20 minutes. With 4:21 remaining to play in the game Dundas tied the game.

OVERTIME

Several end-to-end rushes by both teams failed to notch the winner and prevent the drama of overtime.

Overtime didn't last long or provide much drama as the Raiders maneuvered an offensive play that saved the day. Kudrasovs, from Landry and Gordon, executed a perfect play to score the winner.

The game was another big win for the Raiders as it now moves them over the .500 (average) mark for the season. They proved they can now beat any team in the league. It was their second win in a row over the top two teams in the league. Last week they defeated league leading Collingwood Shipbuilders.

"Anytime you beat Dundas

you've got to feel good," said Blundy. "Without the first loss of the season we'd be well over .500".

Right now the main thing with the team is that they are over the .500 mark with nine wins and eight losses for 18 points.

The Raiders had an impressive showing from another new comer Mike Kealer who played a strong and steady game on the blue line, which sometimes reached forward into the Dundas

end. The whole Georgetown team looked loose and played an open free wheeling style of game that provided the paying customers with an entertaining game to watch.

The Raiders wind up a successful 1979 year, which included his league's last championship, Friday when they play host to the Orillia Terriers. The Terriers have given them trouble all three times they have met. The game faces off at 8:30 at the Alcott arena.

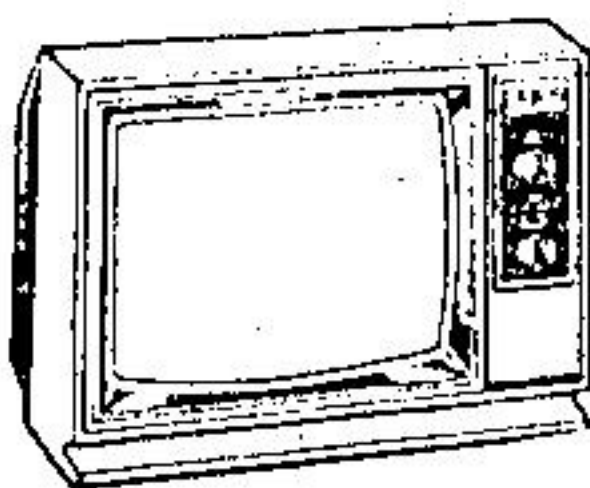

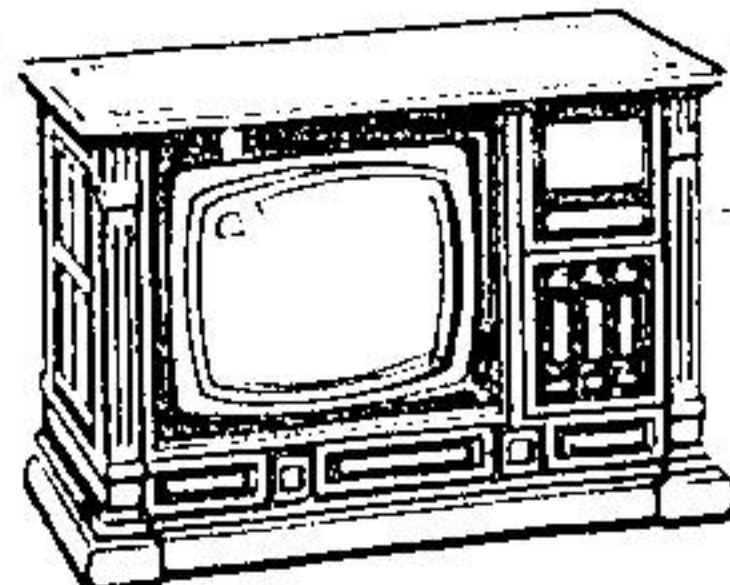

The Assessment Act NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS AND TENANTS
