January 19 at the fairgrounds

Halton Hills Winterfest emphasizes 'fun' aspect

The first annual Halton Hills Winterfest January 19 will include a wide variety of fun-oriented sporting events and a special, free shuttle bus service, according to Tony Evers of the Georgetown Jaycees.

The Jaycees, in conjunction with a number of other service clubs, are organizing this first-ever winterfest. To be held at the Georgetown Fairgrounds, it was decided that this year, each municipality would stage its own winter festival, as opposed to the regional one that was held at Milton's Kelso Conservation area for several years.

"We've only had a couple of weeks to organize this, but we've got most of the events planned," Mr. Evers, in charge of advertising for the winterfest, told the Herald last week.

Mr. Evers said that the emphasis at all of the sporting events during the winterfest will be fun and not competition.

A free shuttle bus service, designed to relieve parking congestion near the fairgrounds, will transport people from the Delrex Market plaza and the Moore Park plaza to the fairgrounds from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Mr. Evers said. The service is being provided by the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce.

Several team sporting events will be on the agenda.

BROOMBALL

A fun broomball tournament, organized by the Flag Football League, will be taking place on the ice rink in the fairgrounds.

There'll be a curling bonspiel, run by the Opti-Mrs., which Mr. Evers said is designed just for entertainment and to give people a chance to stay warm and active.

A deep-snow tug-of-war tournament involving teams of six tuggers will be organized for different age levels by the Georgetown Jaycees.

For the children, there'll be a donut-eating contest, sponsored by Donut Time. While it initially sounds easy, what the children will have to do is eat donuts that are hanging from strings, without using their hands.

A free horse-drawn sleigh ride will be available, also courtesy of the Georgetown Jaycees.

Supervised cross-country ski trails will be laid out in the park and nearby areas, organized by the Outers Club.

To test skill and strength, there'll be a log-sawing contest, organized by the Optimists.

A nail-driving contest, also requiring prodigious strength and skill, will be run by the Elks Club.

Those seeking refuge from the cold will be able to find it at the Saturday evening dance at the Armory. Entrance will be \$5 per couple.

During the times that the rink is not required for other events, the ice will be available for family skating. The outdoor ice surface will be constructed by the town and the community groups.

There will be dog sled demonstrations by several teams courtesy of the Georgetown Jaycees.

People with an artistic flair will be able to show their skills in a snow sculpture contest. There will be a number of categories, including a snowman building contest for children, and the entries can be built either on the fairgrounds or the front lawn of the builder. This event is being organized by the Elks Club.

For warmth and nourishment, hot drinks and food will be available in the Armory and in several booths around the fairgrounds. The refreshments are being organized by the Optimists, the Jaycees and Jayettes.
