## Farmers get guidelines on sludge use

Comprehensive guidelines to control the use of sewage sludge as a fertilizer on agricultural land have been developed jointly by Environment Ontario and the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food, Environment Minister Harry Parrott announced last week.

He said the guidelines are based on a \$2 million research program conducted since 1971 mostly at the University of Guelph by agricultural and environmental scientists.

"They will allow Ontario farmers maximum use of this valuable fertilizer and soil conditioner and at the same time prevent excessive levels of metals, nutrients and potentially noxious substances from endangering food producing land, watercourses and the health of humans and ani-

mals," Mr. Parrott explained. "By allowing a more efficient and safer use of scwage sludge, which is a valuable economic agricultural commodity, the guidelines will benefit both the Ontario farmer and Ontario municipalities," Ontario Minister of

This will allow municipalities to adjust their sewage treatment operations and to review disposal alternatives. It will also allow my Ministry to fully monitor the effects of sludge use. During the second year some sludges may be spread at reduced rates. During the third year,

they may be spread only when municipalities are committed
