Andy Broadbent, who had also been thrown out of the game for being the third man in on the on-ice fight, came running back from the Gemdressing room he was going into and jumped in From there a spectator joined in, followed by team management, arena staff and players from both clubs and then more spectators who came down on top of the fight from the balcony seating above.

There were more than a dozen people flailing away at each other during the 10 minute charade, which went

on around a sprawled out unconscious Crossman, who was receiving emergency

medical attention. By the time the fight was broken up and the two leams separated, four police cars had arrived, and the game had been suspended by the referee. Police remained on the scene while the arena was cleared to escort Dixie players to the waiting bus to take them home. Spectators were given free passes to another Gem game.

NO PROTEST

Gemini President Bob Girdwood said the team received word that Crossman, Broadbent and Marty Power would be suspended for the four games, on Monday afternoon. Three Dixie players Rob Hughston, Les Smith and Daryl Flynn were also given the same suspensions. The \$200 fine is a standard mandatory item when there is a fight on the ice during the game.

Girdwood says the team can not lay any charges and that he didn't think that Crossman would, "Had he been more seriously injured, requiring thousands of dollars of medical expenses, I would have recommended il. It's too messy, too long and too futile."
