New regulations for archers

Good things are in store for Lake Simcoe. The Ministry of Natural Resources has chosen two lakes that are similar in water quality, to be used to breed, or raise Lake Simcoe Lake Trout and Whitefish. One species will go to each lake. This will insure a continued strain of genetically pure fish to restock Lake Simcoe, when the quality improves enough to support itself.

Fish stocks from other bodies of water would not have the genetic qualities that are special to this lake that is so popular. Less and less phosphorous is entering the lake, yet very few Whitefish under the age of twelve years are being caught, and three out of every four Lake Trout are hatchery reared.

If you are fishing Simcoe this winter, be prepared for some good fishing as the stocked Lake Trout population is high and lots of Herring are being brought to the ice.

SOMETHING DIFFERENT

Why not try something a little different than the traditional spreader? I usually prefer to jig slowly and gently with a shortened rod and a regular reel, in fact the Zebco Ultralight outfits are really tops for this.

Use a Swedish Pimple, Pearl tear drop, etc. for whitefish and herring and a Rapala Jig for Lake Trout. Another lure I have found good for trout, especially brook trout in northern as well as southern lakes (those club lakes again) is the small Williams Wabler fished very slow and gentle giving the fish a chance to hit.

When ice fishing with the various types of Jigs, try them out in shallow water first to make sure of their individual action. Often a Gold hook with a Gold bead pressed on the shank will take Brook trout in our northern lakes under ice, and experimentation will often "set you well" when things are slow.

ACCELERATOR

Remington has developed an "Accelerator" cartridge for use in 308 Win. rifles. The first of these revolutionary cartridges came in 1977 from Remington and involves encasing a 22 caliber bullet in a plastic "sabot" of .30 cal. and loading it in a standard 30-06 case.

When this cartridge is fired in a 30-06 rifle, the sabot encased bullet travels down the barrel and as it exits from the muzzle, air resistance causes the sabot to separate from the bullet allowing it to travel with the high velocity and flat trajectory of the 22 cal. varmint bullet.

In 1979, Remington developed a second Accelerator in 30-30 Win. Cal. This year, 1980 they will produce a .308 Accelerator. This one will be a sabot encased .224, 55 Grain bullet with a muzzle velocity of some 3800 feet per second. It will enable owners of 308 Win. Cal. rifles to use their guns with a bullet similar to that of the 22-250 Remington. Greater accuracy and of course economy are the advantages. Good news for gunners.

For archers, there will be new regulation for deer, bear and moose hunting. These will entail draw, poundage, and arrow or bolt size. The archer uses the "long bow", the "recurve bow" and the "cross bow" and these are all included in the new regulations. Rather than list them here, why not get a copy from the MNR or call me and I can get you a copy.

Next week, a run down on the use of maps for fishing and boating this summer. This is the time to get your maps and study them for the coming season on the water. I use, study and carry maps on almost all my trips outdoors, and feel that I gain insight into places I may not have known otherwise. Maps are another aspect of using our ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

Also placing second in their weight class were Frank Meidzinski at 112.5 pounds and Rick Wiamont at 156.5 pounds. Mike Taylor placed third in the 104.5 pound weight class and at 97 pounds, Jim Wittmire had to settle for third, due to a pulled neck muscle that caused him to default his

match.

Doug Gillespie placed fourth at 97 pounds.
