The consensus at the annual meeting of the Georgetown Agricultural Society last Tuesday was that the board needs a number of new directors and new ideas for the 1980 fall fair. Each director was asked to try and interest at least two new people in the organization and bring them to the next meeting. The success and continuance of this time-honored society rests with the enthusiasm of both old and new directors, it was agreed. The ladies' section of the fair is very active, but what is needed is more male participation, directors noted. The auditor's report showed the society to be in a solid position financially, carrying over a bank balance of some \$1,200 from the 1979 fair. A major proposal for 1980 is the possible fencing of the fair grounds. The society is working with the town in this

connection and hopes to interest other organizations using the park, having estimated a potential 20 to 30 per cent boost in revenue if fencing can be installed.
HORSE SHOW
Up to \$500 was allotted to the horse show committee to provide new jumps and repair the old ones. Joyce Gosling gave an interesting and concise report of the district meeting held in Richmond Hill. Don Nicholson reported for the nominating committee and the society accepted the recommendations with a number of minor changes. Herb Dolson was returned president for 1980; Joyce Gosling, first vice president; Denny Charles, secretary and Charlotte Ironside, treasurer, although not present Ralph Cunningham was nominated second vice president, and with his approval, will fill that

post. 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New Bell Canada directory cover depicts century of telephone styles

A colorful panorama of telephones used during the last century is featured on the cover of the 1980 telephone directory for Halton and Peel Regions and Dufferin County, being circulated next month. Bill Barnes, local Bell manager, noted that the company is marking its 100th anniversary April 29. The phones, in full color against a grey background, range from the early wooden box and handset to the modern Contempra.

There is also a message explaining the cover design and listing the years when the 12 telephones pictured were introduced. Some 279,000 copies of the new directory are being delivered, beginning January 28 and ending about February 21, Mr. Barnes said. This is about 1,500 more than last year. Anyone who does not receive a copy of the directory should call the local Bell Canada business office after Feb. 21. Mr. Barnes said the directory contains new telephone numbers for the Region of Peel, 791-9400 and the City of Brampton. The new Brampton number, 793-4110, becomes

effective March 3. One of the new features in the directory, Mr. Barnes said, is a greatly expanded Ontario Government section. Many more services are listed making it easier for the public to get in touch with the service they want. This "Information Access" program being introduced progressively in Ontario directories by the provincial government encourages direct and toll-free contact between the public and the ministries.

RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT OF REGIONAL ROAD 19 AT NORVAL

For the past two years, an Environmental Assessment Study has been carried out on Regional Road 19 in the vicinity of Norval. Meetings have been held with the Public, the Norval Ratepayers Association and various groups concerned with the social and natural environment of the Norval Area. Following various petitions and public input, studies were carried out on several alignments and alternatives. Study considerations covered the Natural Environment including soil capabilities, environmentally sensitive areas, local aesthetics and the Credit River, Human Environment including cost benefits, noise, community planning, traffic analysis, agriculture and functional design of the alternatives. Recommendations following these study considerations have now been developed for presentation to the public.
