

New self-improvement, modelling school

Barbara Young brings 'Elegance' to town

BARBARA YOUNG, a hairdresser, model and cosmetician from Kitchener, gravitated towards fashion and style early in life.

After finishing high school, Mrs. Young had a strong desire to take up a vocation that would encompass fashion and art. Hairdressing, she decided, allows one to be "as competitive as individual desire dictates."

There are competitions to evaluate a hairdresser's competence in style, color, haircutting and, in fact, any segment of the established vocation. Mrs. Young, in one wide-ranging competition, won second place in hair styling and honorable mention in haircutting.

Barbara Young was trained in her vocation in Kitchener,

where she worked before marriage. In 1976, she and her husband and two children, moved to Georgetown after house-hunting in and around Toronto, where Mr. Young works. They chose Georgetown for its "small-town atmosphere", settling in a home in Moore Park.

BEAUTY CHALET
Although Mrs. Young devotes most of her time to running her home and being an interested parent, she also works at Keek's Beauty Chalet on Mill Street. Her children are keen on sports as well as the arts. Jason starts art lessons at Studio 3 in Georgetown and Samantha is in Jazz lessons at Sornic Studio. The artistic side of life "intrigues me", Mrs. Young told the Herald, admitting she wishes she had more time to follow "the many interesting arts and

crafts events in the area". While in Kitchener, a friendship with fellow model Phyllis Huggill began, eventually taking on lasting qualities as the two women launched a business in Georgetown known as the Elegance, Self-Improvement and Modelling School, which will be opening soon.

Courses will be held Tuesday evening each week for an eight-week period at Keek's Beauty Chalet. Elegance's parent school in London, Ontario, is well-established, with an outstanding record of achievement. Graduates are now modelling professionally in London and Toronto.

Students of the Self-Improvement course have gone on to better themselves in their jobs and develop greater self-esteem in the community, while teenagers have found the course beneficial in assisting them with a confident career choice. Elegance is a registered vocational school which encompasses the Georgetown endeavor.

TWO PHASES
The course is in two phases, with Part 1, Self-Improvement, a basis to continue to Modelling, Part 2. The first part covers such things as deportment, hair care, wardrobe and makeup. The

inside-out technique begins with skin care and nutrition, voice production, etiquette which builds self-confidence and self-image, together with good social behavior. This alone gives a student the basic technique of self-improvement which will take the individual as far as personal zest dictates. Modelling, Part 2, prepares one for professional modelling by teaching skills in poise, runway modelling, hair style and exercise. Expertise in co-ordinating a wardrobe is stressed and tuition is given in disco dancing. Self-Improvement Part 1 "must be taken in

order to aspire to Modelling Part 2" according to Mrs. Young.

Barbara Young who will be managing as well as teaching at the Elegance-Georgetown school, explained that after many years' experience in ramp modelling, fashion shows and television commercials, she now wishes to "share my knowledge with others."

She also feels that she and her partner offer Halton Hills "an opportunity they would otherwise have to seek much further from home." An overwhelming reward is experienced by Barbara Young when she sends a customer from the shop with "a higher opinion of herself."

Cultural centre grants sought

Town council has directed municipal staff to prepare the necessary application for grants needed for the proposed new arts and cultural facility.

Mayor Pete Pomeroy said Monday it is necessary to proceed with the grant applications to ensure that they reach the appropriate agencies within the grant deadlines.

The possible grants which are being applied for include community centre, heritage, portable equipment (Winter) and access for the handicapped.

The recommendation, included a number of other directions for procedure.

The Halton Hills Public Library Board will be a tenant in charge of the library and gallery and related activities. The recreation department will be responsible to council for management of the theatre and multi-purpose room.
