Georgetown won the meet, taking 269 points, but Nelson, with 242 points was too close for comfort. Acton showed that they had some very good swimmers, because despite of their relatively small team, they managed to capture 156 points.

Until the meet was officially over, everyone on the three teams thought that Nelson had won. But, the final tally showed that Georgetown had just slipped by winning by 27 points.

Although some best times were achieved by Georgetown swimmers, the general times of the races were slow, the team was just tired.

Georgetown coaches, Tom Adams and Shirleen Vella, have been working the team very hard, giving the team "killer practices" night after night, with no rest before the meet. And as coach Adams said to the team, "You should be tired, you can't expect to have best times with the rate at which we've been training."

His final goal is to taper off at the end of January, giving the team a chance to slow down before the Haltons, on February 7.

In a tri-meet, a team can only enter two swimmers in an event as opposed to a dual meet where three swimmers can be entered. This in itself cuts the possible point total, and also the number of swimmers who win their events.

The winners for Georgetown were: Eric Elson in 50 metre freestyle and 100 individual medley, Don Elson in 100 metre freestyle, Heather Michie and Beth Stewart in 100 individual medley (junior and senior), Erin McIntyre in 50 metre fly, Rick Eastwood in 50 metre freestyle, Kevin Thompson in 50 metre fly, Cheryl Thompson in 100 metre back, Len Fisher in 50 metre breaststroke, Karen Coleman and Andy Bigg in 100 metre breaststroke (senior girls and senior boys).

The team is now looking forward to the Clipper Invitational Meet this weekend in Windsor. This is the first

time Georgetown has participated in this meet.
