## Clark running at Star Games

It's been a busy week for Ian Clark. Sunday he was down in Bowling Green Kentucky where he came first in the junior 1,500 metres to gain a berth on the Canadian team going to Paris in March for the World Cross Country Championships. The local running sensation also got an invite to compete Friday evening in the Canadian open 1,500 metres of the Toronto Star Indoor Games.

Clark, a member of the GDHS provincial championship senior boys' cross country team, placed fifth in the world last year in Limerick Ireland. And last year he competed in the afternoon section of the Star games.

The grade 13 student trains twice a week at York University with coach Brian Barnes of the Scarborough Optimists track and field team. He runs 10 miles each day in Georgetown.

## Massons' favorite sport

At the Masson family home, swimming is their favorite sport. They have a pool in their backyard. So, it is no wonder that this past weekend the three young tadpoles, Cathy, Rob and Susan, mother Joah gave birth to, swam in a sea of glory.

Twenty-year-old Cathy, swimming for Queen's University at the Waterloo university invitational, set a meet record and recorded the best female university time of the year in the 100 yard fly, winning the gold. Her time was one minute flat.

The second-year BA student also took a first in the 100 yard backstroke. She was second in the 200 yard back and fourth in the 200 fly.

Earlier in the year Cathy broke the university record for the 100 yard backstroke at McGill University in Quebec. Twenty-eight years ago her mother did the same thing in the same pool, which was new then but, was described by Cathy as old now.

Meanwhile in Sudbury, brother and sister Rob and Susan, were competing in the Ontario Age Group championships. Rob, 17, won bronze medals in the 1,500 metre freestyle (16.35) and in the 400 metre freestyle (4.07) a personal best. He shaved four seconds off his time in the heat for that final.

Susan had personal bests in the 100 metre freestyle and the 200 metre backstroke. She is 13.

Last weekend in Scarbo-

rough, during an Ontario-Quebec meet, Rob swam a national time of 16.29.20 for the 1,500 to win. That gives him a berth at the summer Nationals in August. They will be held at the Etobicoke Olympium pool. During the past summer in Montreal he earned the right to enter the Olympic trials this June, by racing to an Olympic time of 16.45 in the 1,500 metre.

Also in Scarborough, Masson finished first in the 400 freestyle with a 4.12.68; first in the individual medley with a 4.48.78 time; and third in the 200 metre butterfly with a 2.18.51 time.

Now it is preparation for the Ontario senior championships Feb. 15 for Rob. Then come the Winter Nationals.
