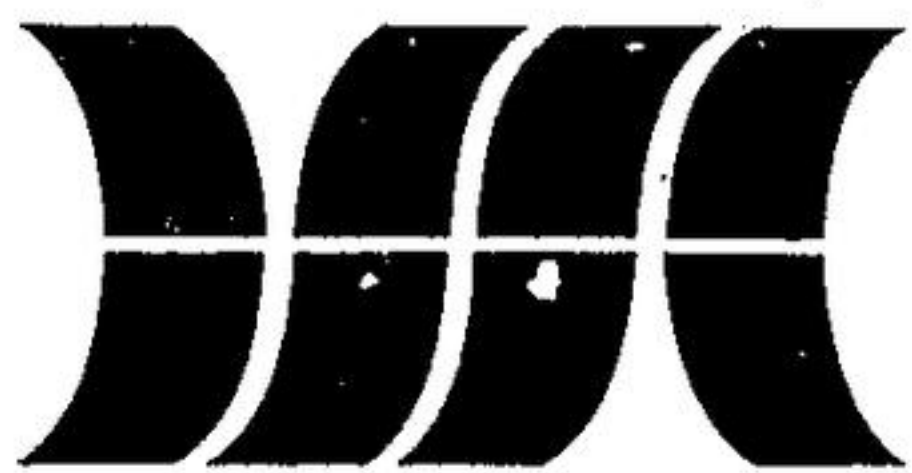


Calendar now available

GLT optimistic as judge visits Separate Tables

Georgetown Little Theatre's upcoming play, "Separate Tables", will be staged in Sacre Coeur hall February 22, 23, 29 and March 1.

February 29, however, is a special night, since that performance will be judged as GLT's entry into the Association of Community Theatres '79-80 festival. The adjudicator is Burton Lancaster, who will be present to evaluate both the performances on-stage and behind-the-scenes.

Mr. Lancaster has been involved in professional theatre for 22 years. After receiving training in the Central School of Speech and Drama in England, he worked with the Old Vic Theatre, the Royal Court Theatre and the New Shakespeare Theatre Co.

In Canada, in 1967-68, he was manager for the well-known "Les Grandes Ballets Canadiennes", Montreal, (Expo '67, tour of U.S. and Canada). From 1968 to 1970, he was the

theatre director for the Charlottetown Festival and then from 1971 to 1977, he was the artistic director for the Magnus Theatre in Thunder Bay.

The summer of 1979, he was made the artistic director of the Red Barn Theatre in Jackson's Point, Ont.

Mr. Lancaster's productions are many, including plays such as "Lion in Winter", "I Do, I Do", "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown", and "Ring Around the Moon".

GLT is very optimistic this year, not only because of its talented performers but also because the set for "Separate Tables" is being designed and built by GLT members themselves. There is more construction work than usual for this play because an addition to the existing stage is being built. The set construction is progressing well as the February 22 opening night draws nearer.

Lorne Scots plan military museum

Still hanging on to those old wartime souvenirs? Then the Lorne Scots need you, not to enlist, but to help out with their newly founded military museum at 48 John St., Brampton.

Lt. Col. Ted Conover, a former commanding officer of the Lorne Scots, the militia regiment with companies in Georgetown, Brampton and Oakville, had thought about a regimental museum as long ago as 1945 when he returned home from the war. It wasn't until the Brampton Fire Department vacated its Chapel Street headquarters and the Lorne Scots moved in that space became available in the form of the old weapons and quartermaster's stores.

Major Al Goodman, curator of the proposed museum, says he has already had calls from Halton Hills citizens willing to donate their time and war souvenirs to make the museum a success.

Because weapons were tightly controlled and webbing and helmets were taken from the soldiers during demobilization after the war, they are difficult to come by. Items of this sort would be most welcome, according to a museum committee composed of Lt. Col. Conover, Major Goodman, Major Dick Honey, Col. Bob Hardie, Regimental Sgt. Maj. Ted Chung, and current commanding officer Lt. Col. Larry Smith.

Some of the items acquired thus far include an old German Marder, a German saw-toothed bayonet from World War I, a folding army bicycle and a great coat made for former defence minister Barney Danson in 1943 when he was working in Canadian intelligence.

The committee hopes to have the museum open to the public by late summer or fall of this year.

Frank Black came to Georgetown in 1952. But he painted his first painting in 1912. He has been a painter for 68 years. Now the popular Georgetown painter will be honoured with a comprehensive exhibition, showing his development as an artist from 1912 to the present.

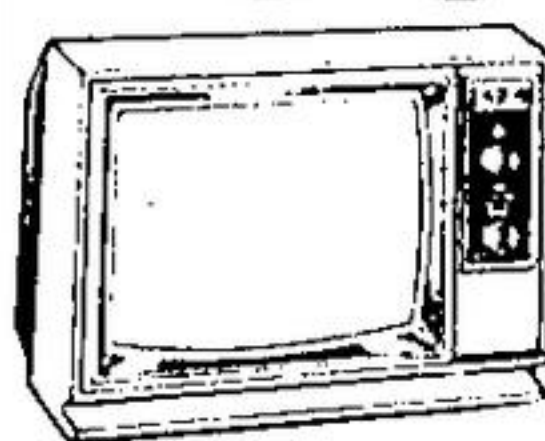

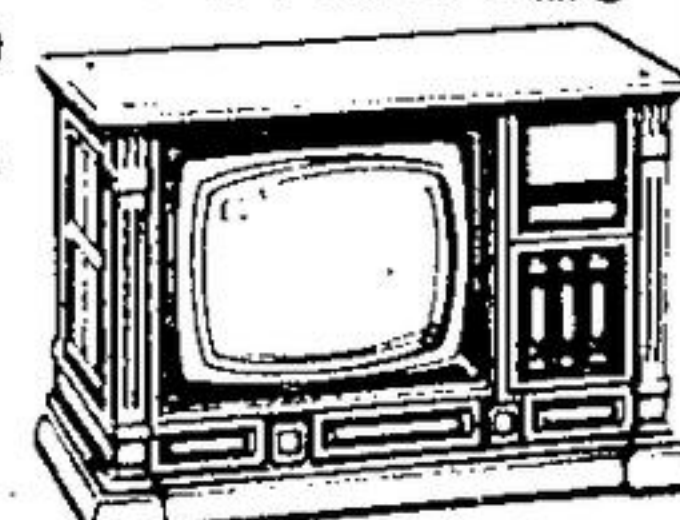
