Clark runs third For Ian Clark, Georgetown's most famous running son, running for fun ceased to be the reason for his assault on a timed course years ago when it became apparent that be could do it and do it well. Now it is a part of his life. Just like getting up and going to school or work.

Friday inght was the same thing, only the names and places were changed. It was an indoor track instead of a cross country trail that he ran on at the Toronto Star Maple Leaf Indoor Games. And it was called a fun run. Nothing could be further from the truth.

The nine other runners Clark lined up against that evening, before some 13,000 people including liberal leader Pierre Trudeau, were not in the race for their own health.

They were there for business. And that translates into establishing one's self as a top class competitor. The 1,500-metre Canadian invitational had some of the country's most fleet of foot men on the track along side Clark, a first time entrant in this event. They were from as far away as Calgary. Clark ran for his Scarboro Optimist club. Wearing number 29, Clark had the number four pole. position next to the corner of the track, at the gun. After

the first corner there are no lanes. Once the race was underway Clark immediately fell into the number three slot in the 10 man field. There he remained, aside from a momentary lap or two running in second, intil the bell lap had been completed and he had crossed the electronic timer at the end of the 12 Jap distance. This time was 3.56.3, just slightly more than two seconds behind (two steps) the winner Scott Robertson of the Calgary Spartans whose time was 3.54.2. Frank Montebello, of the Power Track Club was second in 3.55.4 Ed Tackas, who Clark fied recently to qualify, was fourth at 3 56 8

Clark, who is in grade 13 at GDHS, used the race as a tough time-up for the World Junior Cross Country Championships he is running in next month in Paris.

The slight blond haired lad, told The Herald just namutes after the race, that he was fairly pleased with his performance despite being off his personal best time of 3.53. The world record for the 1,500 metres is 3.37.6, set by John Walker of New Zealand in Long Beach, California last year

at Meple Leaf Gardens in the Canadian invitational 1,500-metre 9 course, if he accepts one of 15 scholarship offers to rman Universities. Right now he says he is leaning toward Berkely in Northern California. --
