Toronto Maple Leaf Dave Burrows and NHL official Bryan Lewis of Georgetown, will be among the 1,000 former Dixie Beehives expected to attend the junior hockey club's 25 year anniversary June 7.

Their junior B team, they also have an A team, play against the Gems.

The team which began in 1952 as the former East York Rockets became, through the sponsorship of the St. Lawrence Corn Starch Company of Port Elgin, the Dixie Beehives in 1955-56. In that first year they developed an affiliation with the Chicago Black Hawks, to send players to their St. Catharines junior A team, the Tee Pees and Blackhawks. That association broke in 1966 through mutual agreement between the NHL and Canadian Amateur Hockey officials.

Many of the team's former players who went on through this chain of teams have all been invited, including

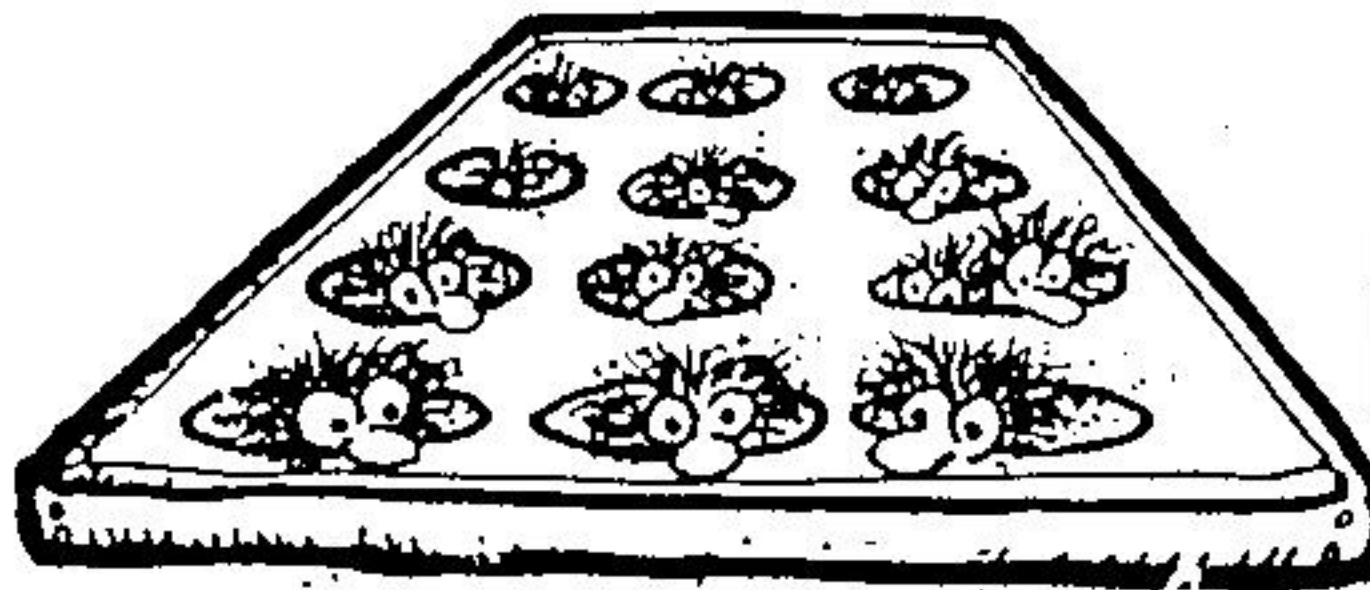
