REVIEW

TV Ontario Workshop, sponsored by Halton Hills Arts Council the latter part of January, was conducted by Eileen Thallenberg from Channel 19.

An interesting film was shown depicting the Murray Schaefer concept of music appreciation through sound. A rendez-vous with nature, where we heard the music of birds and resounding variations of sound by suspended hammers of metal on other diverse pieces of metal, was highly stimulating. The sound of a piano was created by pieces of wire touching on a piano interior and concluded with a sound of a gong. The suggestion was made that we build some of these concepts of musical sound ourselves, then we would better understand the properties that go into such a creation. Mr. Schaefer made the comment, "we have eyelids but we do not have eardrums".

Exercises in sound were depicted by using paper for each individual who then created his own paper sound which in effect was a paper sound orchestra. The importance of sound was emphasized by Ms. Thallenberg who made the comment, "there is no such thing as silence". She then had the audience close their eyes and register in their minds all the sounds they could hear, without speaking.

A reading from Shakespeare pointed out voice projection and clear diction. An interesting film about creating masks was shown which was very explicit and easy to follow.

Pottery technique was covered on film including Egyptian shapes with delicate overlays. Also a film on weaving showing a primitive beginning, explained in a way easily understood.

Once again Halton Hills Arts Council has scored a winner, by bringing an outstanding cultural workshop to Georgetown. The next workshop will be held February 20 at Centennial Public School, Delrex Boulevard, Georgetown at 7:30 p.m. The topic to be covered will be "Creative Media". Information by calling 877-8660.

University offers new courses

The University of Waterloo is offering three courses locally for Halton Hills residents this spring, including an introductory course in sociology and courses in psychology and English.

Lessons will be held one night a week from 7 to 10 p.m. at varying locations. Courses in sociology begin March 31 at the Action public library, the psychology course will be given April 2 at Norval Community Centre, and the English course will begin April 3.

The sociology course will deal with topics such as culture, conformity and social change, and will be taught by Michael Mashey, a Ph.D. candidate at Waterloo. Shalagh Towson and James Mendle will conduct the psychology course with emphasis on social influences and the practical applications of social psychology.

The English course will examine authors such as Ernest Hemingway, D.H. Lawrence, Edgar Allan Poe and Alice Munro, among others. Professor Walter Martin will lead students towards an appreciation of the origins of the short story and authors' purposes when they write this form of literature.

The courses can be taken towards a credit for a university degree, fees for which are \$88 or attended free of charge for personal interest.
