department, the coverage of dental costs for families of welfare recipients.

The same season saw the Kinsmen win the Industrial Hockey League trophy.

1964-65 - Funds were raised through a "Suit of the Month" campaign, the sale of Christmas nuts and trees. The club began looking for a suitable site for its proposed parkette, for which \$520

had already been collected; members umpired Girls' Softball League games, contributed \$100 toward the Glen Williams flood relief fund, sponsored a Seniors Girls' Softball team in the Glen League for \$300, began arrangements for a new senior citizens' residence, assisted by Kinettes with their donations of awnings for the hospital nursery and continues their Christmas welfare program.

1966-67 - Work began on Kincoort, the club's senior citizens' residence, with a completion date set for 1970 at a total cost of \$18,000.

The club donated \$7,900 toward arena renovations and contributed \$607 toward its new parkette.

1967-68 - The club sponsored a visit to Georgetown by the Hell Drivers, an auto daredevil team, and made founding president Clare Burns an honorary member. The local club also hosted the Fall Council for District 1 in Toronto's Royal York Hotel.

1968-69 - Kinsmen once again sponsored Bantam hockey and girls' softball and continued activities concerning Kincoort.

1972-73 - Various fund-raising projects netted the club \$2,000, portions of which bought a trophy donated by Kinsmen to the Georgetown Budokan Judo Club, financed more Christmas welfare baskets, purchased \$1,000 worth of floodlights for the Cedarvale Park soccer field and helped sponsor minor hockey and girls' softball. ARC Industries and Sunshine School Christmas parties also benefitted.

1973-74 - The club sponsored the Bantam hockey tournament once again, donated the trophy for girls' interpretive skating to the Georgetown Figure Skating Club and made donations to Sunshine School and ARC Industries and hosted the Tim McCoy Country and Western Show.

1975-76 - The year saw a Kinsmen-sponsored walkathon to aid cystic fibrosis research.

1976-77 - The Cystic Fibrosis "Bump-for-Life" was introduced at Acton and Georgetown high schools, raising over \$6,200 in its first year.

1977-78 - Kincoort residents received a refrigerator courtesy of the club, while the Bump-for-Life became an annual event.

1978-79 - Kinsmen again sponsored a Red Cross blood donor clinic while expanding membership from nine to 18, thus capturing the District 8 and Zone "D" expansion awards.

1979-80 - Recently, the club sponsored more blood donor clinics, attempting to encourage more group participation in the Red Cross event by establishing the Bucket of Blood "challenge" award.

Kinsmen also spearheaded social nights for local seniors, taking them on guided bus tours of Christmas lawn decoration.

Marking its 22nd year, the annual sale of Christmas trees continued successfully as members began work on the Kinsmen's 60th anniversary Souvenir Edition, a cross-Canada newspaper feature produced by Kinsmen headquarters and Thomson Newspapers.

This April, the Georgetown club will sponsor an inter-club conference for Zones "D", "E" and "H" which some 200 Kinsmen are expected to attend.

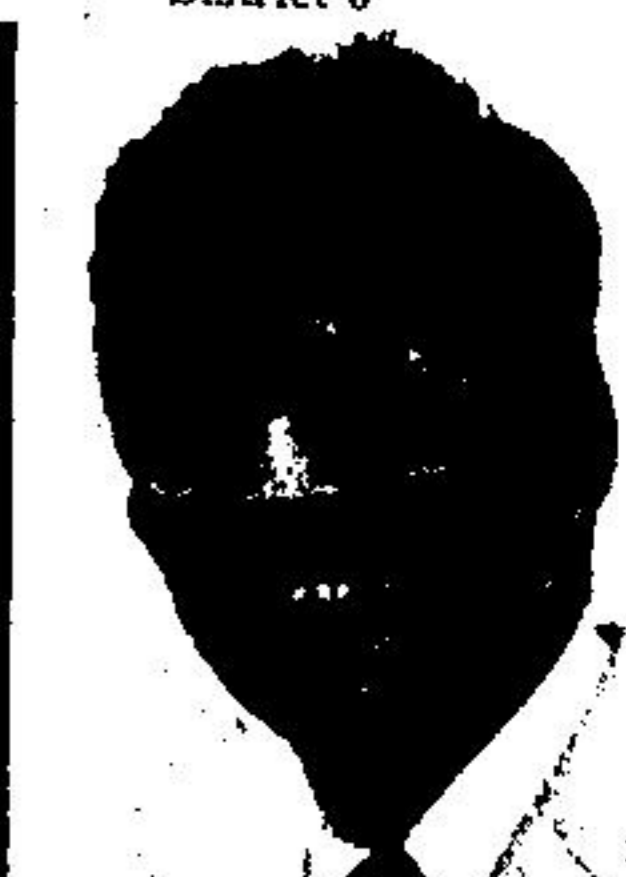

- 5 That they shall carry on Service work within their community

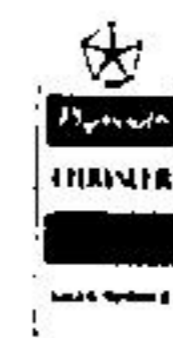
