Keys to group promotion.

Halton Hills Arts Council held a workshop last Wednesday on Creative Media, which captured the interest of 18 participants who were totally engrossed in the workshop format.

John Ollivier from our local television station covering Acton, Georgetown and Milton areas, discussed at length the availability of community television for all non-profit organizations and groups in the area. Questions regarding the amount of space required to set up one or two cameras in a room were floor-ed by members and answered thoroughly by Mr. Ollivier.

The prospect of recording future library programmes once the new cultural complex is built was covered with great input from members and positive response by Mr. Ollivier.

Participants were made aware of the potential television has in promotion. Mr. Ollivier impressed on those present that by requesting TV coverage of meetings and events, the local television station may promote the content of courses, ideals of an organization and pertinent information regarding events. By doing so, memberships could easily grow. Mr. Ollivier encouraged candid programming of groups in session or dialogue within a group who could provide their own animator.

He went on to explain, "Cable television is mobile and will follow your group where the action is in motion". An example of coverage scope was shown by using a video of a guitarist teaching a lesson on television, and Mr. Ollivier impressed on all, that community television "wishes to serve the community". He went on to suggest that requests for coming events coverage should be made six weeks in advance of the event.

Radio CHIC was represented by David Oliver, who stated that "local radio is eager to represent groups as a public service assistance".

The radio station sets aside "a certain number of hours of air time to public service advertising", Mr. Oliver reported, adding that "coverage of events should be requested two weeks in advance".

Through conversation, we learned that paid air time is not as expensive as the layman usually thinks. Of course, choice air time costs more and the costs also fluctuates according to the radio station. Mr. Oliver went on to say "any newsworthy items may be channelled through CHIC news department, together with any requests for interviews."

A radio chat show on the Arts was discussed and Dave Oliver felt this could be a possibility in the future through our local radio station.

We were made aware of News Magazine, a Sunday morning programme at 10:30 a.m. as a good source in which to channel coming events news. The lady to contact is Fran Niblock for such requests. CHIC is so interested in Halton, "They are trying to improve their signal in order to accommodate the coverage in Halton area". Mr. Oliver was eager to answer questions and proved helpful to the inquisitive participants.

The newspaper medium was covered by The Herald, which sent Lori Taylor, who handled the workshop efficiently and she outlined the availability of coverage and newspaper co-operation as well as discussing the method of contacting the newspaper when seeking coverage.

She talked about contacting the newspaper's advertising personnel "who will assist you in spending your advertising budget dollars the best way possible".

The participants flooded many questions regarding advertising layouts which were discussed at length by Lori Taylor and Reg Finlayson of the Halton Hills Arts Council. Mr. Finlayson, who has a career in the advertising field, was great back up for Lori Taylor's well-planned presentation. The possibility of contracting the newspaper to "give a price on one ad a month for a year to publicize an on-going activity or organization, which could be better value for your dollar", was suggested by Ms. Taylor. One way to reach the public effectively would be to "come under the Halton Hills

Arts Council umbrella", who would in turn approach the newspaper to cover a series of arts events.

The groups represented at this workshop included our local library, Georgetown Little Theatre, University Women's Club, Credit Valley Artisans, Georgetown Choral Society, Normic Studio and independent members of the public.

Gretchen Day, Halton Hills Arts Council president, thanked the three guests who conducted the workshop on Creative Media and asked those present to write out their comments as to whether they had a fruitful evening of stimuli in Creative Media techniques. The consensus of opinion was that the workshop was helpful, stimulating and informative. The Arts Council acquired two new members and sold tickets to the coming CAMERATA concert next week.
