Camerata thrilled audience with some old-style melodies

It is somewhat difficult to believe that a concert similar to the one presented by Camerata at Holy Cross Church Wednesday evening was typical of one that might have been heard in Georgetown at the turn of this century.

Inasmuch as the classical music of Beethoven, Brahms, Schubert and Chopin was popular 80 years ago, it would more easily be accepted that this community at that time would more likely have been listening to the rising sounds of American jazz from south of the border or the fiddle sounds of backwoods farmers.

However, through the more than two hours of classical chamber and opera music, Camerata thrilled the near capacity audience with what Camerata's members says was music typically heard here and everywhere during the transition from the nineteenth to the twentieth century. Yet they did point out that although the notes were the same, the instruments may not have been.

Perhaps, then, that is why the music performed by locals in days of old did not sound as sweet and gentle as the sounds that permeated the air in the Catholic church high above the altar that night.

The choice of instruments did make a sound difference. Camerata is a trio comprised of piano, clarinet and cello. On this night the ensemble also included the voice of opera singer Miss Fallis.

The quartet made its way through an opening Hungarian Dance piece of Brahms and included selected works of several of the major classical and opera masters, including Mendelssohn, Sullivan, Danzinetti and Chopin, Beethoven and Schubert. The music would have made these distinguished gentlemen proud.

The evening program had each of the four provide solos accompanied by plane as well as the whole orchestra performing together.


