Akers-Clark determined to beat Norval and league

Akers-Clark not only lost an appeal against a league decision dropping them to fourth from second in the industrial hockey standings because of an apparently ineligible player, they also lost the first game of the playoffs Sunday to Norval. Philp Publishing won the other playoff game 4-1 over the Glen Warriors.

However, coach Mac Korzack is confident that his team can shake off the loss and the league and eventually win the series.

"We really scared them (Norval) on the weekend," Korzack said. "if it wasn't for some bad penalties we took and some bad calls against us we might have won. Mind you complaining about bad calls doesn't put the puck in the net. The guys on this team are really fired

up by the inconsistency in the league executive this year and we want to win this series badly."
