Bridging Canada's time gaps

There are time gaps in Canada. In Burnaby, British Columbia, for example, visitors pass through the white picket fence surrounding Heritage Village and suddenly they're in the early 19th century.

Heritage Village Museum is a genuine-re-creation of a pioneer settlement. Like many others across Canada, it takes visitors back to another era and shows them. in authentic detail, what life was like in a particular region at a particular time.

Heritage Village represents a typical community in British Columbia's lower mainland between 1890 and 1925. Visitors roam the streets and drop in on various "families", stores, blacksmith shop, photographer's gallery and other businesses. Costumed guides answer questions and explain how people lived and worked in British Columbia's carly days.

Like most restored settlements, buildings representative of the era had to be moved to the site from other parts of the province. Seldom does such a collection atready exist intact. An exception in Sherbrooke Village in Nova Scotia.

One hundred years ago, Sherbrooke was a prosperous river port; today, it stands exactly as it did then. The only changes were the removal of disfiguring alterations added to the bulldings over the years.

Sherbrooke is also a rarity in that people actually live there. The Nova Scotia Museum, which runs the historic site, is gradually buying the private homes as they come up for sale, restoring them to historical accuracy and opening them to the public. In the meantime, remaining residents hang "private" signs on their doors and gates.

Most of Canada's living museums demonstrate traditional crafts and activities, At Muskoka Pioneer Village in Huntsville, Ontario, women explain how, in the 1800s, settlers made dye for wool from various flowers and vegetables, and demonstrate how they spun the wool. The resulting knitted goods are sold in the general store up the road.

The general store is one of the most interesting of the settlement's 13 buildings. In use right up until 1953, many of the store's permanent displays, dating to about 1880, were found in the attic when the structure was moved from its original site. Other items are for sale . homemade jams, jellies and relishes, delicious lemonade, licorice and candy sticks, and the wool and other crafts made by village staff.

At Upper Canada Village, in Morrisburg, Ontario, freshly-baked bread and cheese, made the old fashioned way, are sold on the site. while people like the blacksmith, cabinet-maker and newspaper printer show visitors how chores and crafts were handled more than a century ago.

in many cases, it's the staff at Canada's historic settlements that add the final, most convincing touch of reality to the time gaps. To take full advantage of the facilities, guests should chat with them - their problems and humor are exactly as they would have been decades ago.

At Heritage Park in Calgary, Alberta, the minister's wife is perturbed because her coal stove is smoking and the house is chilly; the newspaperman, covered with ink. seems cranky at first and complains lie's "busy as all get-out", but get him talking and he's a charmer.

The old miner, in his shack on the outskirts of town, particularly loves discussing the life and times of mineralseekers like himself - his only companion is an Indiangarbed mannequin who, the old gentleman says, "is not much company."

Particular noteworthy in this village is the Dalziel Barn Museum, constructed in 1809, which contains the country's largest collection of 19th-century toys, displays of a sugar bush and of flax processing, and an exhibit of wood carv-




