Flag Football League largest in Ontario

Despite the fact it's only March, interest is apparently high in the upcoming Georgetown Flag Football season. The League held its first general meeting Sunday, and the turnout was impressive, with six of last year's teams represented, as well as two new groups interested in joining.

League president Ben Heppes introduced members of the executive, then proceeded to outline objectives for 1980. Regular season play will begin June 1 and end September 21 with playoffs to follow. Teams may register until May 10, with preference being given to last year's entries. Other teams will be accepted on a

first-come basis until the full component of eight teams is made up. 🔒

Players interested in joining, but who do not have access to a team, may register until May 17, at which time they will be assigned to a team. Again the earlier one signs, the better chance he has of being. placed on a team, since no more than eight teams of 18 players will be accepted. Heppes was adamant that this year's deadlines are final.

Next to speak was treasurer Rob Taylor who distributed a copy of the league's financial statement. He then outlined planned expenditures for an

emergency care kit, new equipment, advertising, nurchase of trophies and referees' salaries. Taylor also described a proposed referee's clinic to be put on by the Ontario Amateur

Football Association.

Finally, those present were provided with copies of rule changes which were explained by Referee in Chief Ross Elliot, who stressed that every attempt would be made to provide a high standard of officiating this season and that referees would assume much more control of the game than in past years. The head official will handle timekeeping and player substitution, two areas that have on occasion

been surrounded by controversy.

As part of a tougher stand by the rules committee, rough play will be severely curtailed. Fighting will result in automatic suspensions of three games and any subsequent offense results in permanent suspension.

Ross Elliot is looking for anyone interested in becoming a league official. Head referees are to be paid \$10 a game, while linesmen receive \$7. Experience, although not necessary, will be helpful, and officials will attend a referee's clinic for training. Anyone interested may contact Elliot at 877-7936.
