Morrow urges region to work for unity

Herald Staff Writer Former Halton regional chairman Ric Morrow is urging regional council members to use their unique positions in the community to marshall the efforts needed to solve the serious unity problems plaguing the country.

Mr. Morrow, presently a captain with Air Canada, made his impassioned plea for Canadian unity during a special ceremony in the regional council chambers lost Wednesday, where he was honored for his years of service to the region and the county before 1974.

On behalf of the region, the present chairman Jack Raftis presented Mr. Morrow and his wife, Sandy, with a special portrait of Mr. Morrow. The portrait was later hung in the front hall of the regional municipal building, alongside a portrait of the first regional chairman Allan Masson.

"Municipal politicians are close to the people and in a position to speak about national unity without having people think they are doing it for political reasons, as they do of federal and provincial politicians," Mr. Morrow said.

Mr. Morrow said he had an opportunity to see a great deal of Canada when he piloted the airplane that took Conservative leader Joe Clark around the country on the campaign trail, during the recent federal election.

"I had a chance to see first

hand some of the problems that are alienating sections of the country," he said. SHARING RESOURCES

Mr. Morrow said that the key to the survival of Canada is in the sharing of its resources.

"If anything is going to keep this country together, it is the God-given gift of our natural resources and it bothers me to see them being hoarded by some provinces," he said in reference to Alberta's reluctance to share its sudden oil wealth with the rest of the

Mr. Morrow said that recent statements made by Alberta's Premier Peter Lougheed, regarding oil pricing for Quebec should it separate, are going to only create greater alienation.

Mr. Morrow said he felt strongly about the unity problem and suggested that someone confront Mr. Lougheed about the effects his nctions are having on the rest of the country.

"Sooner or later, somebody will have to stand up and tell Mr. Lougheed where to get

off," he said.
