

Ontario Outdoors

With the Sportsmen's show out of the way, it is time to get down to the spring ritual of sorting, repairing and replacing fishing tackle. Rods are of great importance to the fisherman-woman, and often take great stress during the season. They are thrown in the rear of cars and trucks, stuffed in tents and trailers and otherwise abused.

CLAIM TO KNOW EVERYTHING

With a little thread on the windings and a covering of varnish, your rod can look as good as new. However, the guides should be checked for wear and sharp edges, or all the other work may be for naught.

The greatest of the procrastinators, as far as repairs go, are the so called professionals, those who fish all the time and claim to know everything. Often they are too busy fishing to take the time out for tackle maintenance, until it is too late. Of course then they have to buy new equipment, and that is always good (for someone).

REELS should be taken apart and the parts cleaned in a cleaning solution, checked for wear and weak spots, and put back together with light grease. If you need parts, don't expect to get them in a hurry, as everyone else is trying to get a head start on the fishing season. That is why I do all my maintenance in the fall and winter months, when no one is busy.

Lures: The hooks should be checked and if they are too far gone, replace them. This could be from bent points that have snagged too many rocks, rusted, or bent out of shape. A little polish on the body of the spinners and spoons, paint on your plugs and a general cleaning of the boards of flies in your tackle boxes will give you a lift on opening day, to say nothing of a few extra fish on the stringer or on film.

Oh yes, the tackle box itself. Nothing turns a fish off faster than a lure smelling of fly dope or grease from a tackle box that is never cleaned out.

Remove all material from the box, wash in warm soapy water and dry quickly with towels and then allow to air dry to be sure. Repaint metal boxes and replace cork or felt liners. The new plastic tackle boxes are rust proof, clean, and almost indestructible. Now may be the time to consider one.

All my tackle boxes are plastic and many companies have a wide assortment of sizes and styles for all kinds of fishing and fishermen. A lot more could be said about preparing tackle for the fishing seasons coming, but practical common sense should dictate what is needed, and I am always available to answer any questions.

In the coming weeks, this column will feature the seasons as they approach, and the best methods to fish the various species.

Average spawning temperatures of water are printed here for your help: Pike-40-52F, Walleye-43-63F, Muskellunge-49-60F, Smallmouth Bass-60-63F, Largemouth Bass-62-65F.

First season to open is the Trout season and next week I will try to give as much information as possible to get you into fish, and keep the fish coming throughout the year. Till then make sure you have a copy of the fishery regulations, and study them. There is no excuse for fishing out of season and none whatever for taking game fish of other species when fishing for trout. Respect these regulations as they are designed to keep our fisheries viable for a long time.
