'Leather Town Village'

Mall's theme borrows on heritage

Making a new shopping facility and its owners both fit into the community is an important part of having a successful shopping area, in the view of one of Acton's newest downtown landlords.

Merv Pryhicka is in the process of converting the large building on the corner of Mill and Willow Streets into a five-store mall, which he will call Leather Town Village.

His enthusiasm for the town and the almost completed initial phase of the mini-mall bubbles over as he describes his project.

"I first realized the potential of the building about three years ago," he says. "It's one of the best corners in town with respect to potential for a series of stores. It's quite visible from Mill Street, yet not overly congested. By coincidence, it became available in mid-1979, and I grabbed it."

Mr. Pryhicka plans to convert the existing store into three smaller shops, two of approximately 500 square feet and the third of 700 square feet. When that is completed, he will tear down a tin storage shed at the rear of the building and add two more 450-square foot stores. After them comes completion of two studio apartments above the stores.

A photography shop has already been finalized and is expected to open in early April. A merchant who had intended to open a shoe store has decided against it, and Mr. Pryhicka is making a decision

this week as to who will take the store instead. His own leather good shop will not go into the third store, but will be put in a third phase at the back, he has decided.

The mall's motif will be a leathery, woody one, Mr. Pryhicka says. He plans to add stylized shutters to tie in with a cedar canopy running the full length of the building. The bricks will be strapped and a textured emulsion surface added to that the whole mall will have a warm, inviting color of browns and tans.

Leather logos will add to the complementary signs and lighting on the structure.

"I don't believe in plastic-type stores," he says. "Acton's history is tied to the leather industry and I want to use that."

"I am also very concerned about the family unit so that I will be planning something for every age in the family in the stores. I am also being very selective about the people I choose as tenants for the stores. I want people who will fit well with Acton, as well as being good business people

judging from their past experience."

He is also looking to future business trends in selecting the type of stores he will include, and wants store owners who will complement each other besides having the type of personality that sits well with Acton residents.

Since Mr. Pryhicka feels window shopping can prove an interesting pastime for families, he intends to have plenty of glass in the storefronts so that customers can

view attractive displays.

While individual stores may open as soon as their quarters are ready, Mr. Pryhicka expects it will be early fall before the entire mall can hold a grand opening.

Mr. and Mrs. Pryhicka came to the Acton area about four years ago from Toronto because they didn't like living in the city. He is a store planner and runs MP Merchandising Design Services in Brampton.

"I like working with my hands," he says, "and I think I'd be a contractor if I wasn't doing what I do."

When the project is complete Mr. Pryhicka intends to advertise widely so that non-residents may be drawn to Acton.

"Other areas advertise here so that Acton people shop in Guelph and Brampton and Georgetown and Milton," he says. "Why shouldn't we draw their customers here?"
