#### Greener pastures

Forestry crews and field staff of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority launched a tree planting campaign last week which will see some 120,000 seedlings on private properties in Halton Hills, Mississauga, Caledon, Orangeville and Erin. Planters have begun with the replanting of 3,000 uprooted cuttings of willows, poplars and forsythia at an abandoned gravel pit on Authority land north of Highway 24 in Caledon. Private landowners can purchase the trees from the ministry of natural resources, paying Authority staff a nominal fee for planting services.
