## Mobile gunmen concern farmers

Halton farmers are concerned about city people who have been firing guns from moving cars while out hunting groundhogs in rural areas, Milton Mayor Don Gordon told the Halton Regional Police Commission Thursday.

Police Chief James Harding will be investigating complaints that his officers have not followed up citizen complaints, even though citizens say they have provided licence plate numbers of cars. The police commission requested a report from Chief Harding at the next commission meeting.

Mayor Gordon, a member of the police commission, told commissioners that he had received complaints about police officers failing to take action against protests from residents in the Milton area who have complained about private citizens discharging firearms from moving vehicles, even though in some cases, those complaining have provided police with licence plate numbers from the vehicles.

## Bank notes go on display

With soaring inflation rates seemingly threatening paper currency with extinction, local residents may be interested in viewing a display of old bank notes from the Toronto Dominion Bank's collection at the Halton Hills Shopping Centre branch beginning May 13.

The exhibit will be available for public viewing during regular bank hours: Tuesday and Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., Thursday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. An antique gold weighing scale will also be exhibited.

Included in the two displays of more than 25 old bank notes will be an 1857 \$1 note from the City Bank, a \$3 note issued by the Farmer's Joint Stock Banking Company in 1849, and a 1863 \$1 note from St. Stephen's Bank and a \$5 note issued by the Maritime Bank of the Dominion of Canada in 1881.

The displays illustrate the rapid evolution of money in Canada. The first paper money issued was "playing card" money, in common use for approximately 75 years in the colony of New France. Few examples of this money exist today, probably because retention after the redemption date was punishable by death.

Later, bank notes were issued by private bankers and merchants, predominantly in Lower Canada. During the pre-Confederation 1850's and 1860's, banks obtained charters and issued their own currencies.

The central bank, the Bank of Canada, was created in 1934 and given sole responsibility for the issue of paper currency in Canada.

In 1935, the first paper notes of the Bank of Canada were issued, with each denomination being bilingual for the first time. During the next 15 years the chartered banks were requested to decrease their notes by percentages. By 1950, in accordance with the program, chartered banks paid to the Bank of Canada sufficient funds to redeem the amount of

their notes still in the hands of the public - over \$13 million. The last note of the Bank of Toronto was issued in 1937 and the Dominion Bank issued its final note in 1938. Today, few people see anything but Bank of Canada notes except in collections or exhibits.

"We are very pleased to bring this collection of old bank notes to Georgetown," branch manager Roger Shollice commented. "I hope that many people will get a chance to come into our branch and enjoy these fascinating examples of our past."

The exhibit will be on display until June 14.

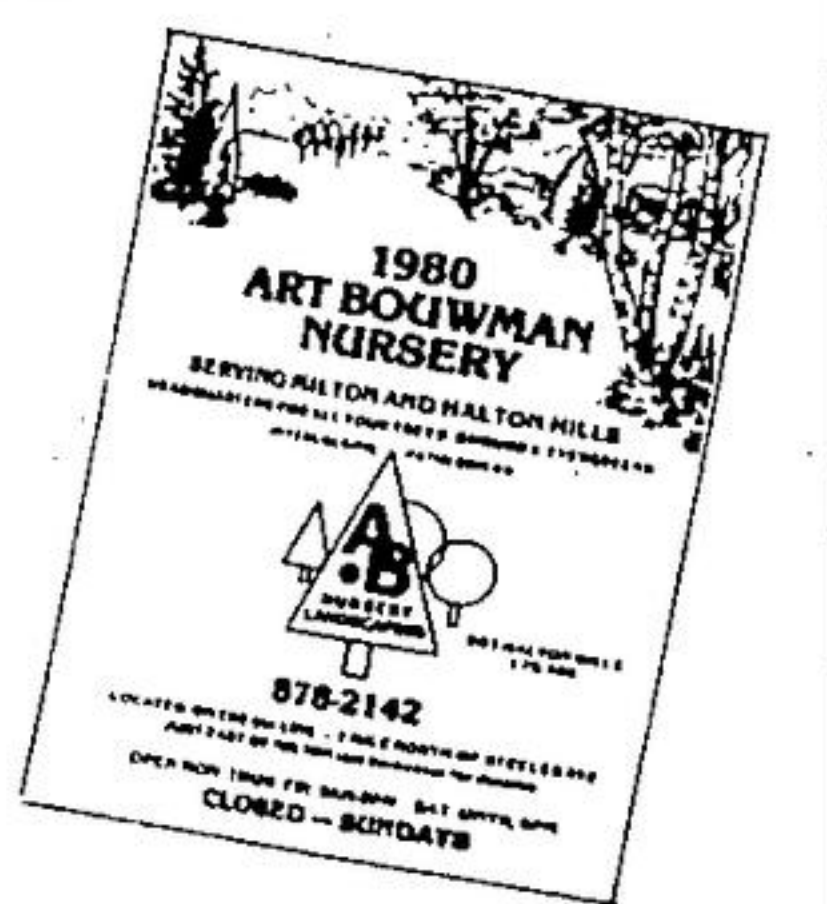

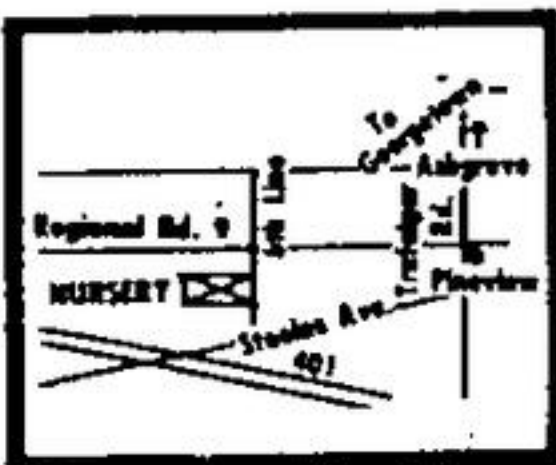
