Vintners Club congratulated on their 'well-made' wines

For the past nine years, members of the Georgetown Vintners club have been working at a craft that has become increasingly beneficial to their pocketbooks the more liquor store wine prices rise.

The club gathered in Erin Sunday for an official wine judging session that demonstrated how amateur winemakers can produce some fine vintages equal in most respects to a majority of overpriced varieties at the LCBO.

Major Robinson, a Kitchener-based wine taster dispatched by the Amateur Winemakers of Ontario (AWO) association for the

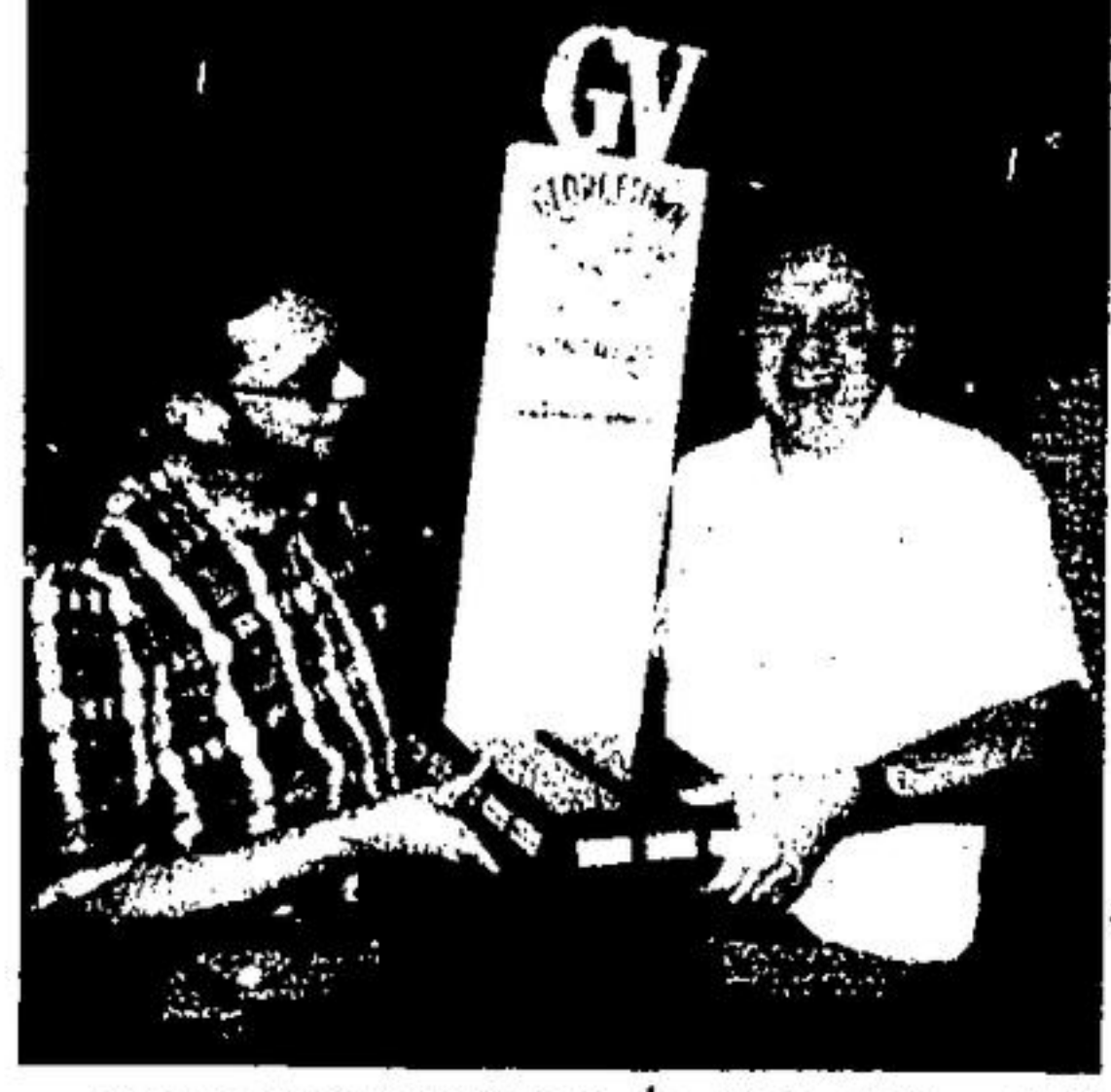
occasion, thoroughly examined - without actually swallowing - samples of some 30 entries from the Georgetown club intended for provincial or even national competition.

Once established in a well-lit alcove of the Justice home, where the testing took place, Mr. Robinson examined each sample in turn visually, sniffed the bouquet and sipped enough to roll about his tongue before discarding the sample and recording his impressions. Plain white bread and mineral water were at hand in case the taster felt his taste buds were getting saturated.

More than two hours later he emerged from the alcove to compliment the club as a whole for its "well-made" wines, among them, he said, a few that are "outstanding". Only the club entries in the aperitif categories drew the judge's warning of a possible weakness.

The judge's findings placed Jim Justice in top place overall for the second year in a row, followed by Myles Gilson (The Herald's own PMT camera operator) and Les Smith, who designed and built the club trophy and prepared the award-winning label seen on club bottles.

Major Robinson's evaluations in the 12 wine categories gave Mr. Justice first-place credits for his sparkling, dessert and sweet social wines as well as his cider, along with second places for his white table wine (with which he tied club president Brian Robinson) his rose, his after-dinner and dry social wines.

Mr. Gilson's rose and dry social wines captured first place, while his sweet and dry aperitifs came in second, as did his sweet social wine with which he tied Peter Philpott.

Mr. Smith caught the judge's attention with his first-place red table wine, his dry aperitif, his second-place dessert wine and his new label design, which turned out to be the only new label submitted for competition by a Georgetown club member this year.

Other first-place winemakers were Bob Radigan (sweet aperitif), AWO vice-president Brian Robinson
