Industry '80 begins Thursday

This weekend's Industry '80 exhibit sponsored by the Georgetown Rotary Club, will give some of the smaller local manufacturers and suppliers needed exposure and allow them to mix with the area's larger industries.

The show is to start tomorrow (Thursday) at 10 a.m., open initially to trade only, and will be formally opened by Ontario labor minister Robert Elgie. The exposition continues through Friday and Saturday.

This is the first show of its type in Georgetown and it has drawn interest from a large cross-section of industry from Halton and Peel.

Exhibitors in the show will be able to attend seminars presented by the Federal Business Bank, designed to provide information on business financing and money opportunities. Representatives from the federal employment department will discuss opportunities for skilled labor, training and supply.

Could have avoided strike

A strike this spring by 120 Halton region public works employees could have been avoided if there had been better communication between management and staff, Milton Coun. Bill Johnson claims.

Calling on regional council to establish a labor-management committee, Coun. Johnson charged last Wednesday that some works employees don't even know Bob Moore, Halton's public works director.

"We, as elected members of this council, have a responsibility to the people of this region to keep things moving smoothly," Coun. Johnson said. "A joint labor-management committee will improve relations between works employees and regional staff and perhaps avoid another strike."

'HONEST THIEF' AT CANNES

The Paramount movie "Never Trust an Honest Thief", much of which was shot on location here in Georgetown, is to be previewed in a preliminary, unedited form at this month's Cannes Film Festival in France.

Stephen Chesley, chief Toronto publicist for the George McCowan comedy, is already in Cannes carrying "product reels" of "Honest Thief" around along with similarly excerpted portions of John Huston's "Phobia" and completed prints of "Double Negative" and "Tanya's Island", all shot for the most part in Canada.

Mr. Chesley has expressed hope that some important interest can be drummed up for "Honest Thief", starring Orson Welles and Michael Murphy, among cinema producers and distributors at Cannes. A fall or winter release date is planned.

Complex start soon?

Construction of Halton Hills' proposed \$1.7-million library, theatre and arts complex is scheduled to begin at the end of the month, a year after the project received approval from town council.

Toronto architect Keith Wagland has designed a complex which will incorporate the existing church building with a

theatre and a new library. The library will be four times the size of the existing facility, and the complex will also include an art gallery, a 281-seat theatre and meeting and change rooms.

The construction schedule will take about 15 months and the official opening will be held some time in the fall of 1981. The cultural centre is being

funded by over \$1 million in lot levies, debentures and capital funds which council has already set aside for the project. Provincial grants will cover \$265,000 of the cost, and \$200,000 must be raised through public donations. The Rotary Club of Georgetown and the Georgetown Little Theatre group have each pledged to raise \$30,000.

One dead in car crash

A 26-year-old Brampton man is dead and several others seriously injured following an accident Sunday afternoon at the corner of the Sixth Line and 17 Sideroad in Peel.

Ronald Joseph Doucette, 26, of Brampton, is dead, five others are in hospital with serious injuries following the accident, which occurred about 2:15 p.m. Sunday.

A car driven by Zvonimir Pevec, 43, of Mississauga, was southbound on the Sixth Line when it collided with the car driven by Mr. Doucette, which was eastbound on 17 Sideroad.

Mr. Pevec escaped with minor injuries. Mrs. Pevec, 41, was admitted to Georgetown and District Memorial

Hospital with multiple injuries, and is in stable condition. Their son, Alexander, 16, also suffered multiple injuries. He, too, was admitted to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, where he is in stable condition.

Marlene Doucette, 26, is in serious condition in Peel Memorial Hospital. Michael Doucette, 2, is in critical condition in Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto. Michelle Doucette, seven months, suffered facial lacerations and contusions, but has no other injuries. She is in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Pevec has been charged with careless driving. The date for his appearance in court has not yet been set.
