motivation. You've got to be persistent." Apparently, a student who has experience and skills may be beat for a job by another student who simply tries harder, or comes across better, to the employer.

A job hunter can't be shy. Mrs. Harper says that the most effective way to find a job is not through the Canada Employment Centre, but through "walk-ins". This means simply walking into a place of business, introducing yourself, and explaining that you're looking for a job. Another effective method is through "connections". Let if be known to friends, relatives, neighbors, and anybody else you can think of that you're searching for a

Scanning the classified ads in the paper regularly is not the best way to find a job. It might work, but don't rely on it totally.

The Student Manpower Office is stocked with brochures and pamphlets relevant to any student looking for a job. They include helpful information on tax deductions, the minimum wage, employment standards, and hints on how to look for a job.

Any student looking for employment should get out to the Canada Employment Centre for Students. Before I did, I was unemployed. Now I have two part-time jobs.




