# Be willing and motivated

It's nearing the end of May, but if you're a student looking for summer employment, it still isn't too late to

go job-hunting, and registering at the Canada Employment Centre for Students wouldn't be a bad idea. The staff at the Student Manpower office at 232A

Guelph St. (where Toy Magic used to be in the Guelphview Square) is co-operative, helpful, and efficient. Sharon Greenstade and Mary Connor, both student placement officers, and Erika Harper, the supervisor, are all sympathetic to the plight of the job-hunting student. According to Mrs. Harper, the aim of the Canada Employment Centre for Students is two-fold: "First of all, to find student workers for employers, and secondly, to find employers for student workers."

businesses to find out what their summer personnel needs will be. They then try to select from the files of Student Manpower people that will fill those requirements.

The office has been open for some time already, but the official opening will be next Wednesday. It will remain open until August 31. Last year, in a similar period of time, the office found a total of 509 jobs.

When asked what is needed by a student looking for a job, Mrs. Harper immediately replied, "Willingness and

motivation. You've got to be persistent." Apparently, a student who has experience and skills may be beat for a job by another student who simply tries harder, or comes across better to the employer.

A job hunter can't be shy. Mrs. Harper says that the most effective way to find a job is not through the Canada Employment Centre, but through "walk-ins". This means simply walking into a place of business, introducing yourself, and explaining that you're looking for a job. Another effective method is through "connections". Let it be known to friends, relatives, neighbors, and anybody else you can think of that you're searching for a job.

Scanning the classified ads in the paper regularly is not the best way to find a job. It might work, but don't rely on it totally.

The Student Manpower Office is stocked with brochures and pamphlets relevant to any student looking for a job. They include helpful information on tax deductions, the minimum wage, employment standards, and hints on how to look for a job.

Any student looking for employment should get out to the Canada Employment Centre for Students. Before I did, I was unemployed. Now I have two part-time jobs.

# Seniors' apartments delayed

The takeover of the Acton senior citizens' apartment complex by the Halton Housing Authority has been delayed again for an indefinite period over another construction setback.

Housing authority spokesman Dolly Moulden said last week that during an inspection Friday, flaws in the construction were discovered which necessitate a further delay before the building is ready for occupancy.

The 52-unit building was originally scheduled to open in early March, but the opening has been repeatedly postponed. Mrs. Moulden said there are more than enough apartments for the people on the waiting list.

No leases for the apartments have been signed yet, and no rents have been set. The rents are calculated on an individual basis, depending on the person's income. Seniors who have already paid rent on their

apartments when their apartment in the new residence opens can have their rent in the new building waived provided they have a receipt

for the rent they have already paid. Senior citizens on the waiting list will be contacted when the opening date is arranged.

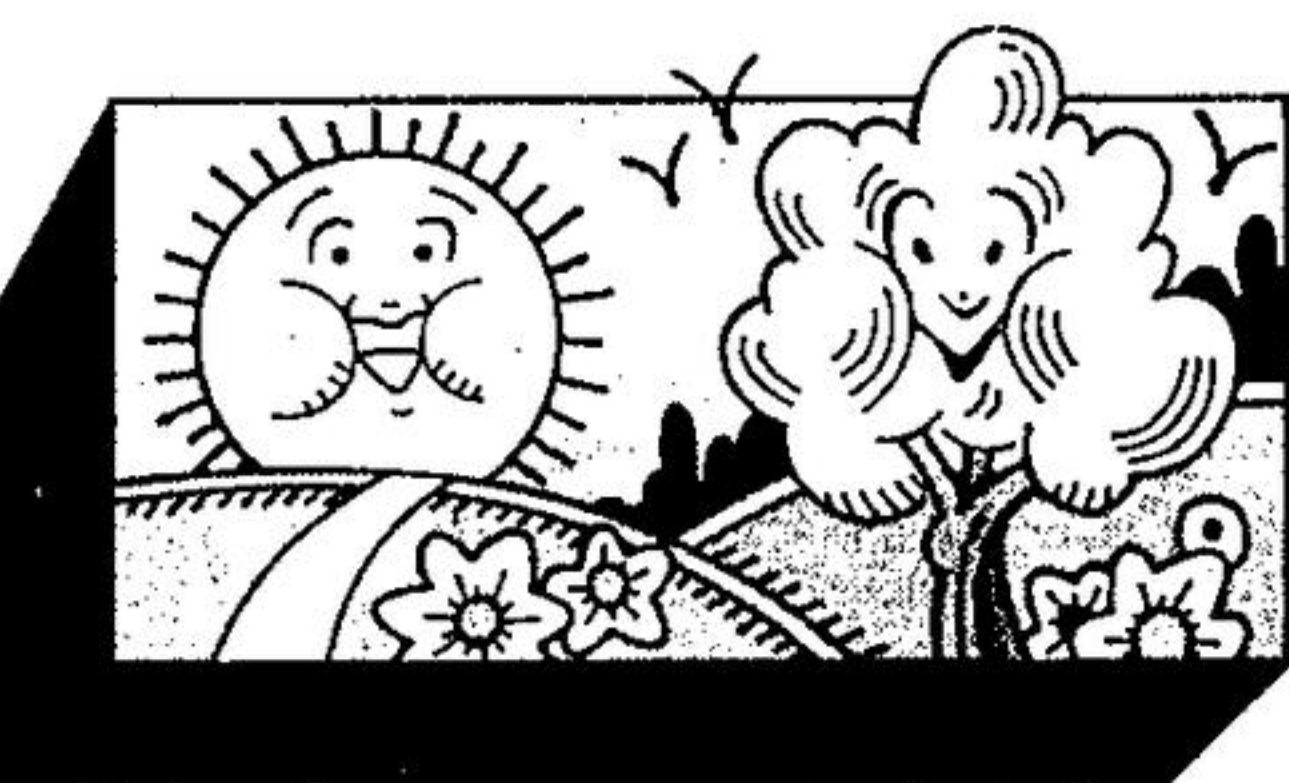

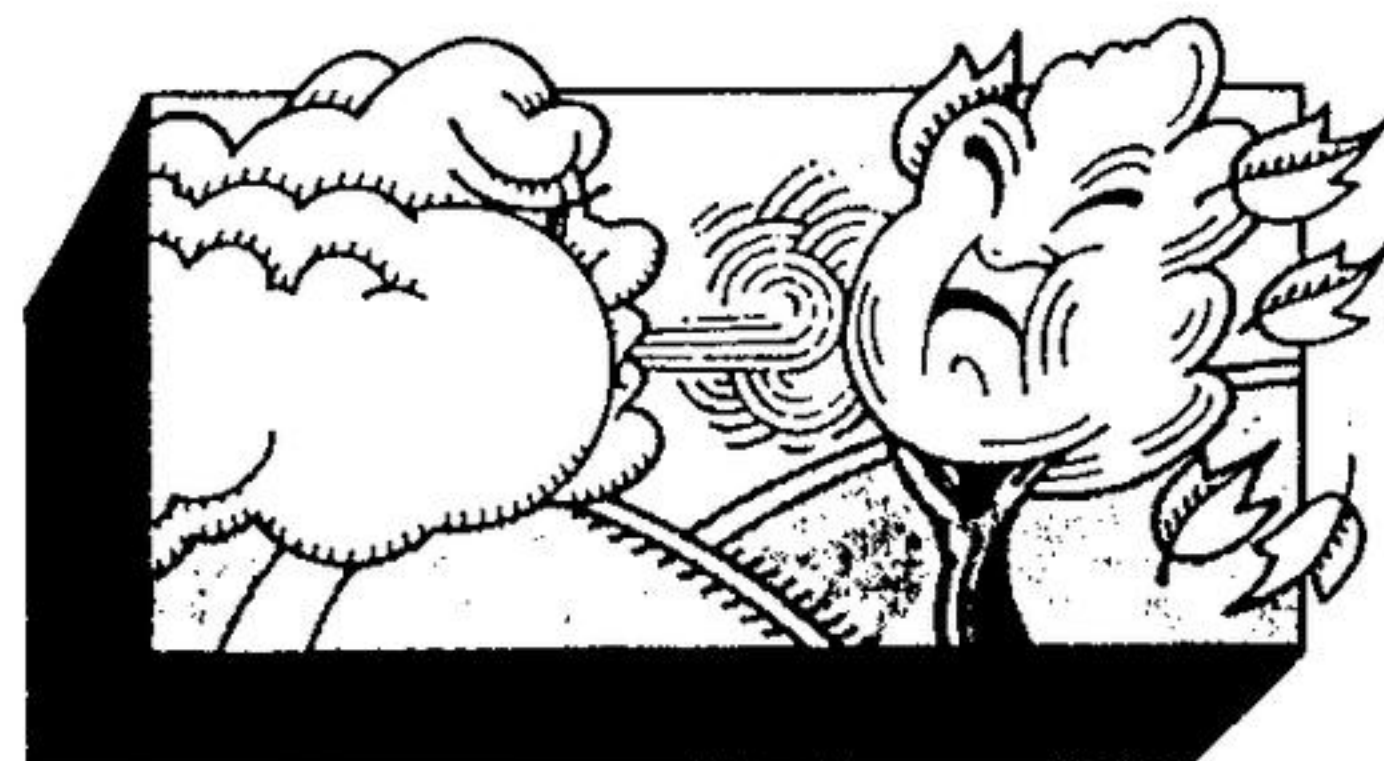
