We look forward to a council resolution which will formally reject recommendation related to the sale of the Mary Street Park, and which will encourage the recreation department to continue its efforts to maintain and develop it in a way that is consistent with the suggestions in our brief

Since Master Plans such as suggestions offered by both this can have a profound

impact upon a community, it is to be hoped that future Plans related to other issues will include a clearly defined mechanism for soliciting public feedback. Goatsbeard, Thisties, Chicory, Polson Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot, and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dandelion and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act, Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.


