On the other hand, within the framework of Confederation, Quebec can still continue to enjoy equalization which is giving us all the time so badly needed to move ourselves from the era of petroleum into the era of alternate energy and conservation.

Also necessary at this time, is a sharing of technology among all provinces. There may be some misguided idea that because of Quebec's wealth of hydroelectric capacity, it can manage huge transfers of energy consumption into that medium. The lessons have already been well learned in the United States and certainly in Ontario that while some transfer of utilization is possible and desirable, the wholesale transfer into an all-electric economy is prohibitively costly and technically impractical. It, therefore, stands to reason that in the area of energy, each province has something to give to the other and each has a benefit to receive.

Mr. Speaker, our great Country is a diverse land, containing yet 'unimaginable wealth' the development and exploitation of which has often been held back by the time and energies wasted on our differences, instead of being invested in those aspirations which are common to us all and in a sincere attempt to understand and walk hand in hand with one another.

The very fact that we recognize Canada as a mosaic rather than a melting pot, indicates that we expect of one

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another level of maturity and generosity of spirit that is perhaps not expected or demanded in all other countries. The benefits to be gained by recognizing this fact of Canada are to make us unique among nations and to give us a potential for fulfillment greater than any other country. Let the word go out by the means of this resolution that a 'No' vote will confirm our resolve in Ontario not to accept the status quo but to work with all of our talent and ability for a greater Canada, one in which the fears and inhibitions of the past, will be replaced by the light of courage, challenge and opportunity.

Canada, created as it was; not out of an act of revolution, not out of an act of war; but out of legislation in peace. And as an act of love - Let us continue in that spirit.

Now that the Quebec referendum has been held, Halton MP Otto Jelinek can't wait to get Parliament back to work.

"The whole referendum issue has overshadowed the day-to-day economic issues," he said last week. "I'm not saying that it wasn't important. It's just that it did overshadow economic matters and there hasn't been any work done on them in my view."

Mr. Jelinek says he feels the outcome of the referendum was clear from the beginning and it hasn't done that much good anyway since Levesque and those voting in favor of sovereignty association have stated plainly that they intend to continue working toward separation.

It will now depend on the government's ability to come up with the solutions necessary to satisfy those who voted against separation. The provinces all want renewed federalism, he says, but it will depend on what measures the government takes in changing the constitution where those who voted against separation go in the end. Mr. Jelinek says it is unfor-

tunate the government chose to deal with the emotional issue of separation first rather than with the economic issues which he feels contributed to the situation. Any institution from a marriage and a family to a nation has more unrest and a

larger danger of breaking up when there are economic problems facing it, he says. Had the nation's economic problems been tackled first, Mr. Jelinek feels it would have helped to simmer down the emotionalism connected to the referendum.

Brian Cargill, of Acton, an executive member of the Halton Progressive Conservative Association, is glad to see the end of the referendum question. "Working for a Quebec-based company I can appreciate the turmoil," he says.

"There'd have been a severe backlash if the vote had gone for separation."

"One point a lot of people seem to have overlooked is that we didn't elect their provincial governments and we had nothing to do with the stranglehold the church has kept on the people."

"We seem to be getting the blame for these problems that held them back but those were internal things we had nothing to do with."

Mr. Cargill contradicts the charges that anglophones are stealing the francophones language. He says no one he has discussed the question with has ever been able to prove how this is happening. "I want them to be equal," he says, "but I'll be damned if I want them to have special status. No one can operate in French in a sea of two million who can't speak French."

"I think the majority of people finally realized they were getting a good deal from federalism. Now if they get the ground rules firm up and the economy going the little things can be ironed out."

Expect few changes in constitution - MP

The new constitution being proposed by Canadian leaders in response to Quebec's resounding "no" vote in last Tuesday's referendum will closely resemble the country's current constitution, according to Brampton-Georgetown MP John McDermid.

The new constitution will look "an awful lot like the one we have now," Mr. McDermid commented last

Wednesday, adding that the existing British North America Act has served Canada well.

"(Reform) is going to be a long process," he said. "It's something we're going to have to be patient with."

The MP said he is delighted with the referendum's outcome and described his mood on Parliament Hill last Tuesday night as "one of pleasure."

"We in the rest of Canada have to realize there are changes to be made," he noted.

Mr. McDermid cautioned, however, that constitutional reform won't provide the whole answer to Quebec's and Canada's mutual problems. Much of the problem involves attitude, he said, and there are many problems to be found elsewhere in the country as well.
