

# Ontario Outdoors

Lots happening this week, but a note of interest, the North York Civitan Club held a fishing day recently. They used the Pleasantview outdoor pool and the Ministry of Natural Resources donated 1,000 rainbow trout. Lots of fun for crippled kids and a very interesting day.

Hay Bay, in the Bay of Quinte, has been producing large numbers of Walleye and Green Land, well out from Wauabushene is also producing.

Kleinburg will be the scene of two special days, June 7 and 14. These days are called Landowner days and will train landowners on the methods of attracting wildlife to their properties as well as better woodlot management.

June 14 is especially important, as the topic will be stream improvement, and pond management and the best preservation of wetlands. These workshops are sponsored by the Metro Region Conservation Authority and the M.N.R. along with various organizations interested in the preservation of wildlife. Further information at 661-6600.

With the hot weather here, when fishing for trout, seek out deep pools in streams and head for bottom in lakes and ponds. Use a natural imitator such as nymphs, streamers and small spinners. You may need some weight to get a spinner down that deep in the lake, so choose a weighted spinner such as the Mepys Aglia Ligi. This spinner has an elongated blade and is weighted so the balance is correct for fishing deep.

June 28 is the opening for Bass, and with this in mind I am planning to specialize on this fine game fish at the open house June 14 at Zellers in Georgetown. It is hoped that there will be one of the top rod manufacturers with me demonstrating their line, possibly even a... well let's keep it a surprise. # International football clinic

Visits by celebrity soccer players and detailed instruction on tactics and teamwork are among the highlights of a summer course planned by Soccer International for July 1 through 5.

Sanctioned by the Georgetown Youth Soccer League, the course is open to boys and girls seven to 15 years of age, regardless of their current level of play. The sessions will take place at Georgetown District High School.

Soccer International spokes-

man Jeff Stephen told The Herald last week that coaches from his Toronto-based organization will be here to conduct the sessions, placing emphasis on the development of all soccer skills, sportsmanship and "invigorating, fun-filled competition."

Players aged seven to ten years are eligible to register for 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. daily sessions at a cost of \$21 for the six days. Those 11 to 15 years old can register for afternoon sessions, 12:30 to 4:30 p.m., for

\$21. Players will be assigned to study group teams according to their age and individual skills. Additional information is available from the town parks and recreation department at 877-5185.

Stephen explained that the course will include visits from celebrity soccer players, films on the sport, special goal-keeping sessions, lectures on the laws of the game, instruction on tactics and teamwork and some tournament play.

**Georgetown Team No. 2 4 - Red Devils 0**

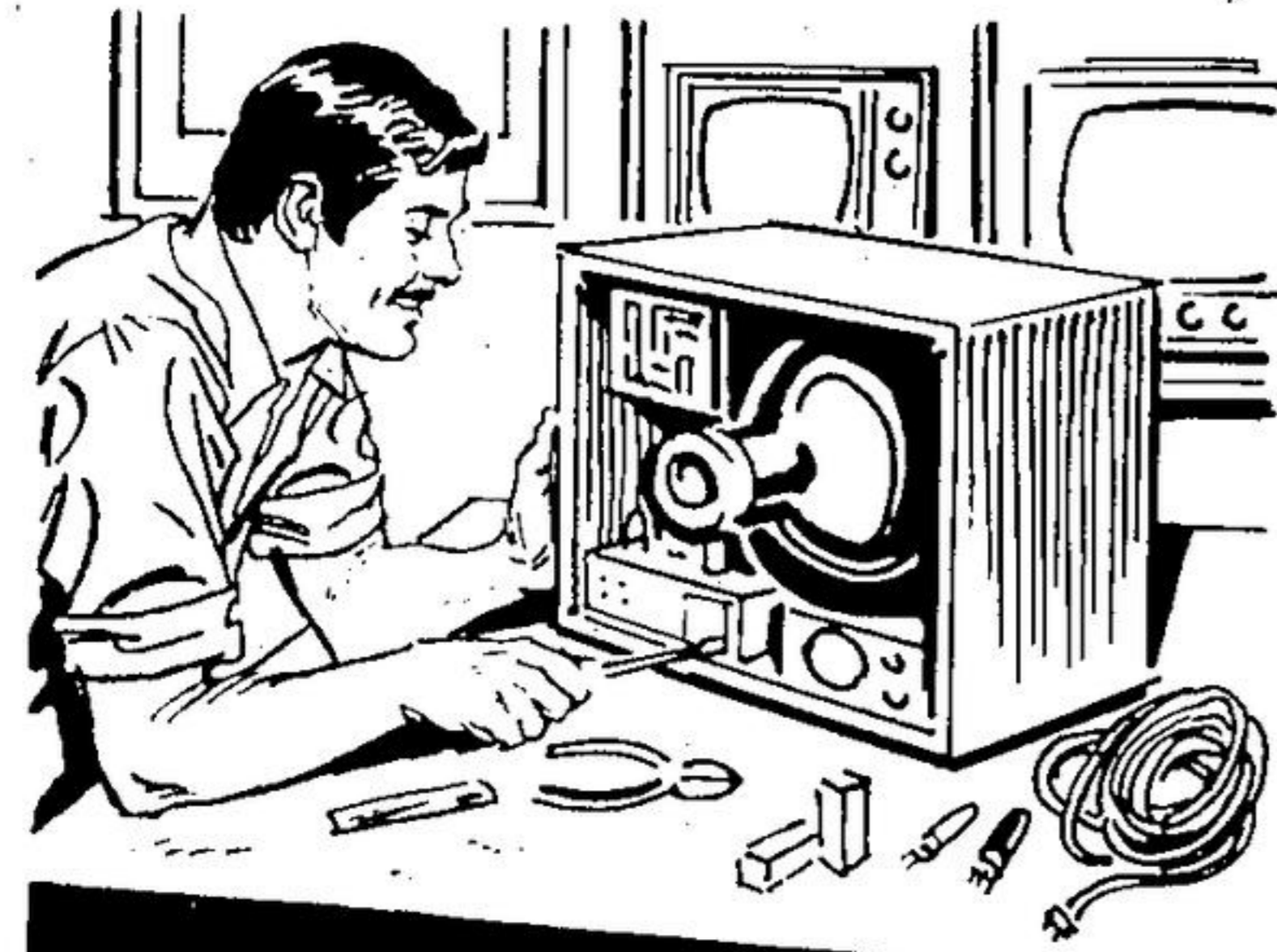
