The balmy climate of Maui captivates visitors year round

The Pan American seaplane, Hawaiian Clipper, brought the first paying air passengers to the Hawaiian Islands after a 20 hour flight from San Francisco on October 22, 1936.

Today, three million visitors a year flock to the Islands from all over the United States, Canada and increasingly, Japan.

A particular favorite of the visitors is Maui, an uncrowded, semi-rural isle, blessed with a benign climate that leaves both air and water temperatures comfortable year round.

Maui's popularity is of long standing. Charles Lindbergh raved about Seven Poins, part of Haleakala National Park in the extreme southeastern part of the island. Both Mark Twain and James Michener devoted pages to praises of the island.

Today, many visitors return home convinced that "The Valley Isle" is the highlight of Hawaii, and locals are quick to agree. Their slogan, "Maui no ka oi," means "Maui is the best."

In addition to its annual average temperature of 75°, Maui offers vacationers 33 miles of beaches, water ideal for swimming, sailing, scuba, snorkeling and deep-sea fishing, tennis and golf, good restaurants and more than a half-dozen deluxe hotels.

The newest hotel, the Hyatt Regency Maui, has a lobby the size of three football fields, plus seven waterfalls, a network of streams, bubbling hot springs and many tropical birds and plants.

Among the other outstanding hotels are the Royal Lahaina, Maui Surf, Inter-Continental, Lahaina Shores, Kaanapali Beach, and Wailea Beach.

The Wailea Beach Hotel, nestled in its own silver sand beach, offers magnificent beachfront accommodations, some of the island's finest restaurants and shops, two PGA championship golf courses, easy access to all of the island's attractions, and the Wailea Tennis Club, with 11 courts (three lighted), pro shop and teaching staff.

Shortly after its opening in 1978, the hotel was selected by *Tennis Magazine* as one of "America's 50 Greatest Tennis Resorts."

The nearby 13-acre Wailea Town Center features a village square lined with boutiques, arts and crafts, and many other exciting shops.

Maui does offer some of the best shopping bargains in the Islands. And shopping is one-time to none in Lahaina, the second-whaling town that

combines elements of Fisherman's Wharf and Sausalito with a distinct New England touch.

Lahaina's shoreline shops offer excellent buys in scrimshaw carvings, denim coral necklaces and unusual tropical T-shirts.

Its waterfront bustles with activity day and night. A full-day sail to the neighboring island of Lanai, Hawaii's pineapple capital, includes a hot barbecue lunch and considerable free time for swimming and sunning.

Whalers from Mystic and Nantucket made Lahaina their winter home a century ago, and whale-watching remains a popular pursuit. The humpbacks, which sometimes jump full length out of the water, are now under the protection of law.

Other sightseeing attractions include 10,000 foot Haleakala, a dormant volcano that last erupted in 1790. Active volcanoes on the Big Island of Hawaii can be seen from its summit.

Its crater, one-half mile deep, two miles long and seven miles wide, seems as desolate as the lunar surface and was used by Roman American astro-

nauts for moonwalks.

First-time visitors, plus the more budget-minded repeat travelers, would be wise to rely on the expertise and buying power of such tour operators as American Express, Princess Tours, specializing in deluxe programs, and regional operators such as Pleasant Hawaiian Holidays out of the West Coast and Sunlight Holidays out of the Midwest.

American Express, for example, offers 11 Hawaiian vacations for 1980 including several to Maui. The escorted "Two Islander," which also includes Honolulu, features three nights at the new Hyatt Regency. Their 3-day Maui Fly drive includes choice of hotel and Hertz sub-compact car for 2 days.

Still another option is the "escorted" way. Tours such as the 10-day Hawaiian Trio and Beachcomber and the 14-day Hawaiian quartet, Polynesian Adventure and Grand Hawaii all include Maui.

Americans play host to a steady flow of foreign visitors

Foreigners are finding America an attractive travel destination in record numbers, according to the U.S. Commerce Department and, as a result, Americans are learning the fine art of playing host.

Travel industry experts believe Americans will respond to their international guests with the same helping hand they received during their own trips abroad.

"Americans really are a friendly bunch—especially the ones who live beyond the large cities and have more time for everything, including enjoying a visitor from a foreign country," writes Majorie A. Cohen in *Where to Stay USA*.

Language can be the most difficult barrier for foreigners, but can be overcome through a simple toll-free telephone call to the multi-lingual USA Desk operated by the U.S. Travel Service.

The desk handled queries from visitors seven days per week at (800) 255-3050. Operators speak English, German, French, Japanese, Spanish and several other tongues.

Mexicans and Canadians, who constitute the bulk of foreign visitors to the U.S., have their own branches of the USA Desk at home.

In the top 15 most visited cities, American Express has staffed its offices with multi-lingual travel counselors and all American Express Travel Offices are geared up to help travelers away from home.

US Chamber of Commerce statistics for the calendar year 1978 showed a foreign volume of 19.8 million visitors, or 5.7 million with Mexicans and Canadians excluded.

The 5.7 million figure represented a 28 percent increase in visitation from foreign nationals other than those from America's borders. Indications point to an even larger increase in the immediate future.

In 1979, Singapore Airlines began service to the U.S. and the American Express Visit USA program produced dramatic increases in passenger volume from both Australia and the United Kingdom.

"No matter what a person's origins are, he can find something in the States that will be of interest to him," explained Des Whelan, Senior Vice President of International Travel Products Marketing for American Express.

"We talk about America's value, its charm, its excitement, its contemporary nature

and the fact that every race is represented here."

Growth of an affluent middle class in both Southeast Asia and Latin America is expected to spur even more interest in the United States as a travel destination.

Many of those new visitors will tour Florida and other points in the southeast, which drew 3.2 million tourists, 17 percent of all international arrivals, in 1977 and has been steadily growing in volume since.

Among the most popular cities included in the itineraries of international arrivals, according to *Where to Stay USA*, are New York, Boston, Washington, Philadelphia, Denver, Houston, Chicago, Phoenix, Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego.

Attributes of the National Council for Community Services to International Visitors (COSERV), located in many states, arrange for foreigners to be houseguests in American homes, while Servas (Room
