Seek 3-way stop signs at Cobblehill, Victoria Rd.

A request for three-way stop signs on Cobblehill and Victoria Roads in Acton won't be granted until town engineer Bob Austin has prepared a report on its necessity. Cobblehill Road resident Ro-

bert Fleming told the town's general committee Monday that the signs are being requested as a means of dealing with motorists travelling down the Incline toward Highway 25 at speeds which present a danger to children.

Mr. Fleming said he had spoken to residents of the houses surrounding the proposed location of the sign and they support his request. He added that he could circulate a petition very quickly if necessary but didn't see the need for

such measures.

Mr. Austin said a sign had been requested in that location before, but council decided against it after viewing the site on its spring roads tour a couple of years ago, Staff had recommended against the sign at that time, Mr. Austin said.

Coun. Mike Armstrong rejected a request from Coun. Russ Miller calling for a staff report on the need for the sign, saying he doubted that traffic has increased that much in that time.

Coun. Ed Wood agreed. "Let's take the bull by the horns and give the people what they want," he said.

Coun. Miller pointed out places where other residents are also concerned about speeding, such as the hill in Stewart-

town on Trafalgar Road. While it would be ridiculous to put a stop sign there to control speeding, he said, if council doesn't get a report before authorizing the installation of a stop sign, it would be setting a precedent, and anyone anywhere would be just as entitled to a stop sign as the Cobblehill Road residents.

"If you do it for one you have to do it for all," he said.

Coun. Armstrong remarked that stop signs won't prevent speeding. The report should really examine ways to stop speeding, he said, not where to
