Last week the Junior Falcons were listed by me as 1-0-1 in games so far. My information was incorrect, although it did come via one of the players. 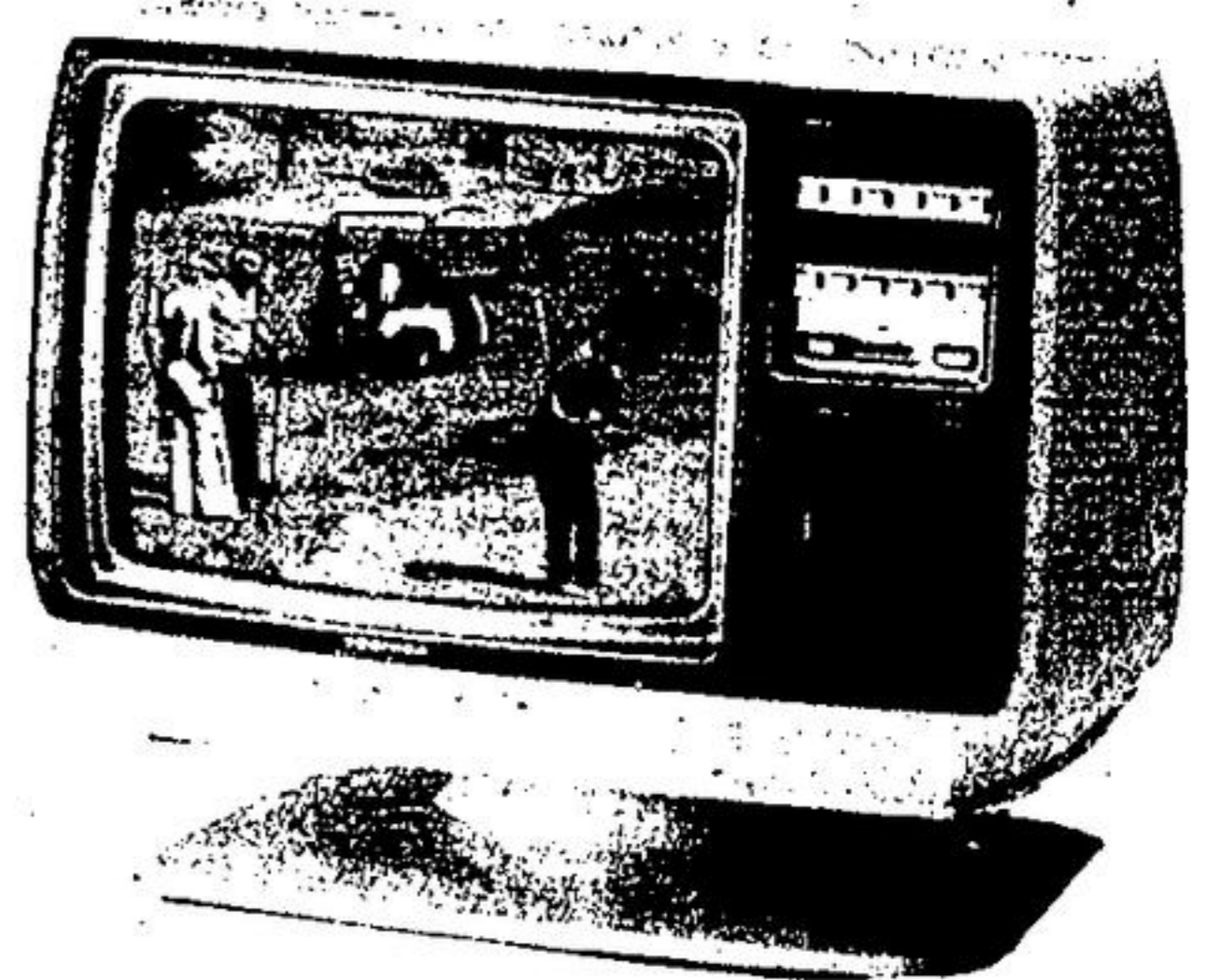
