

ID program ready to roll

Operation Provident will be going into action late this week or early next week in Acton, Georgetown and Milton.

Six students have been hired to operate the program. Karen Patson and Christine Arbic of Acton, Janet Suk and Fiona Smith of Georgetown, Perrianne Waters of Glen Williams and Heather Praught of Milton will start visiting businesses in the three communities within the next week.

Project leader James Baird said the past few days have been spent in orientation with the police department and providing the women with

information on Operation Provident so they can answer the inquiries of businessmen about the program.

The engraving machines which will be used to engrave specially registered identification numbers on office and business equipment will arrive soon, and Mr. Baird said there will have to be practice sessions before the women start visiting businesses.

The Halton Hills Independent Insurance Agents Association is providing details for the program, as well as funds for the printing of a pamphlet explaining the aims of Operation Provident, Mr. Baird said.

Acton parking ban

The town's general committee recommended Monday that council should prohibit parking along Main Street in Acton around the Kingham Road and Wemy Street area. Since the road allows for a turning lane as well as a through lane at that point, parking must be stopped to keep both lanes open. Parking will be prohibited on the west side of Mill Street as far north as Cobblehill Road to ensure drivers a clear view of the road when entering Main Street from Cobblehill. The Ministry of transportation and communication will have to approve the parking restrictions as well as council, since the road is a connecting link.

Church St. speeders

An attempt to curtail speeders on Acton's Church Street may result in the installation of stop signs at the intersections with John and Wilbur streets. Town engineer Bob Austin pointed out Monday that before a bylaw can be enacted authorizing the signs, local council and regional council would both have to approve it. He also said the most effective way to reduce speeders would be to reduce the number of drivers using the street, rather than by installing stop signs. He expressed hope the installation of the signs would have the effect of removing some of the traffic, since it would no longer be a through street serving as an alternate route to Mill Street.

Weekend teachers' talks

Negotiators for the Halton board of education and the Halton secondary teachers' federation are waiting for mediator Martin Teplitsky to settle their year of bargaining sessions to form a two-year contract.

Following a full three days of bargaining in Toronto over the weekend, the mediator will sort out items left undecided by the negotiators.

Cam Jackson, head of the board's negotiating committee, said both sides made very impressive presentations and negotiations were intense

ive during the three days. Although they were able to work out several minor clauses, the decision on the major items will be made in the mediation report.

Although he has heard a rumor the report might be ready for Wednesday, Mr. Jackson said Mr. Teplitsky gave no indication to the negotiating teams just how quickly he would finish his report. It is expected within the month, however.

Mr. Jackson said the board is now ready to begin negotiating with the elementary school teachers. Their contract ends

in August. Secondary school teachers in Halton have been without a contract since August, 1979, and mediation will result in a two-year agreement for them. The teachers and the board disagreed on the amount of the pay increase, retirement gratuities and staffing increases during negotiations.

In April, it appeared the teachers would strike to back up their wage demands, but an intensive bargaining session with Martin Teplitsky averted a strike, on the condition that their differences would be presented for mediation-arbitration as soon as items for a two-year agreement could be worked out.

The original negotiations only covered one year.
