# HEIS is for children's needs

The Halton Board of Education Thursday adopted the Halton early identification strategies (HEIS) already in use for several years as a specific procedure to determine a child's learning needs and abilities as he enters kindergarten.

The board also passed a recommendation in connection with this which states that all kindergarten programs in Halton begin no later than the eighth school day in September each school year.

Education director E.S. Lavender said the ministry adopted much of the program, which Halton has been following for several years, in 1979, but since Halton has never formally ratified the strategy it is now time to do so.

The ministry has said the school year can't be altered in June to allow kindergarten teachers time out of the classroom prior to the usual closing date, and there is no longer funds to hire supply teachers to free up kindergarten teachers for home visits, Mr.

# Board flexible enough to meet future - report

Little change will be needed in the organization and structure of the Halton Board of Education in order to meet its needs over the next few years, according to a report presented as part of the long-term

Rev. Garry Morton, chairman of the board's organiza-Uon and structure committee, which prepared the report, said last week there is a need for flexibility in board structures and organizations. The Halton board already has this built into its system and Rev. Morton feels this is one of the board's strengths.

The board operates with ad hoc committees except for the ones regulred by provincial legislation. This system has served Halton well and should continue to do so, the report

indicated. The report recommended the deletion of several policies which are no longer in use. The decline in enrollment has meant a drastic drop in the number of new teachers entering the system annually and thus the policy on the orientation program for new teachers is no longer worth keeping. Also recommended for deletion were the policies on professional development fund, education development and leave fund, and leave of absence. It also recommended updating the list of school names as set out in a policy.






