Once again, a great turn out at the open house at Zellers Saturday. It seems that fishing is becoming more popular each year, and this brings us some good news and some bad

First the good news. Fishing is a fantastic hobby, sport or just a passtime enjoyed by all ages. The bad news. We need better control of our fisheries and the Ministry of Natural Resources are not providing it.

WHERE AND HOW With the focus on Bass fishing, many of the folks stopping by to visit Saturday had a lot of questions on how and where to fish. Such a wide variety of questions can not be covered in one column, but can be spread over several weeks. Why not write to me with your questions on any kind of fishing problem or need for information, and I will answer them in this column. My address is 25 Carole Street, Georgetown L7G

A plastic worm or leach was in the demonstration tank at Zellers, and very few fishermen use these lures and they are probably the best bass lures there are on a consistant basis. The accompanying diagram this will show you how to rig a plastic worm in a weedless manner, so they can be (ished right in the middle of any weedbed or brush tangle you can find. After all that is where the fish are when feeding and hiding, so why not fish them there.

Thanks to the Mepps company, we had the opportunity to see how a Mepps Spinner works in the water.

Breck's also provided the Mepps spinners for the prizes listed below. I have caught a lot of BIG fish on Mepps and this includes Bass, and the same company, Breck's make a fine fly line and probably one of the best series of flies I have seen anywhere. The demonstration rods were well received as they should be, they were Fenwick.

Every skilled fisherman looks forward to owning a Fenwick rod, yet they are within the reach of almost any budget, except of course the \$200 fly rod that was on display. They come in almost every size and style with some exclusive to them. We showed casting, spinning, fly and ultra light rods. Thanks once again to Fenwick for the opportunity of trying out these fine rods.

NOT A PURIST


I personally use almost all legal and sporting methods of fishing which means spinning, casting, fly, spincasting, trolling etc., but my favorite method of fishing Bass and Pike is with a fly rod. By no means am I a purist using only one system. I thoroughly enjoy my balt casting outfit, but for shear pleasure the fly rod with a Bass Bug is hard to beat. Special rods for this purpose are made by Fenwick and others, and even fly lines are especially designed with Bass Bugging in mind. Fairy Lake in Acton is a good place for this kind of fishing as there are clear areas for the back cast and in a boat the weed beds are hot spots for the floating bugs.

If you are a Bass enthusiast, then why not join the organization dedicated to the Bass angler. The Bass Anglers Sportsman Society has a magazine published ten times per year and is packed with information and new methods and equipment for the bass fisherman. As a member, for the last few years, I can highly recommend it, and if you want information on how to join, then call me at 877-9290 or write to the above address.









Start hook point in center of worm head and fat a 30 degree angle) push point out through worm body about 1/2" from the head.
