## Our Bulldogs tug in crown

Acton Bulldogs tug-of-war team has started its new season with back-to-back wins at the Newmarket Highland Games June 7 and the Speyside Highland games this past weekend.

The team expects to be busy most of the summer, and with their recent successes to boost their morale, look forward to a good showing at Port Elgin.

Next weekend, Cobourg, July 5, Brantford July 12, Cambridge July 19, Burlington July 26, Fergus August 9 and possibly Dutton August 4. The crown of the season

will be competing in the world championships at the Canadian National Exhibition August 16. Depending on what class they are put in, they may wind up taking on the world champion Metro Toronto police team.

Chuck Mitchell, organizer of the team, says it all started last year with a bunch of guys sitting around talking. They decided to enter the Speyside Highland Games as a tug-of-war team for something to do.

They didn't do very well last year, since they were brand new at it and lacked the necessary cleated boots and broad leather belts. Although they had to turn down an invitation to compete at the CNE championships because of those things, they were pleased to receive an invitation and will be at the event this year.

The boots they require for competition cost \$200 a pair from a British Columbia supplier. The team was able to find a few pairs which a shoemaker fixed up for them. They still need sponsors though, since transportation is expensive, too.

So far, Alton Melsaoc Concrete, A.P. Green, Gordon Dawe Real Estate and Campbell Furniture have sponsored them, and Forum Sports, Guelph, did the lettering on their uniforms.

The team members are mostly Acton men, with a couple from Rockwood, one from Milton and one from Port Hope. They meet each Wednesday and Sunday to practise and are pulling and lifting weights to get into shape for the competitions. Training began in April but may go on all year after the success they are gaining.

Legs are the teams' problem," Mrs. Mitchell says. "They are running and may start doing some climbing to strengthen their legs. They have the arms for it but they need to build up their legs, too."
