THE LOFT GALLERY is owned and operated by Ellen Melton and Helena Onopriejenko. Ms. Melton has plans to show a specific artist at intervals during the year.

"The Loft is an area conducive to this type of art display," she said.

Since opening the gallery, Helena and Ellen have been pleased with the walking traffic frequenting the premises to view the art pieces on show.

Some of the artist's work shown include watercolors by Ron Warnock, monoprints by Jo Walterson, batik by Laura Dittrich, as well as her dried flowers and dried leaves on cards. Frank Black's oils, pen and pencil sketches by Roy Booth, muted oils by Camille Egan, watercolors by Ms. Melton, together with oils by de Long' and pen and pencil sketches by Donna Haworth.

In this artistic environment surrounded by many gift ideas, novelty items as well as practical ceramic pieces, you'll see interesting designs and colorful co-ordinated sets of giftware. Once outside with a quick turn to the left, you'll be travelling down Mill Street towards Main, and as you cross the light, the next stop may well be THE HOT BED. The name originated from early sales of wood burning stoves, which are still a segment of this business.

The shop now shows a wide selection of pottery by Canadian artists, some from our locale, and crafted toys, wooden items, hand sewn children's clothing and tableware which is a colourful collection of Canadian crafts. Fine Art is also shown at THE HOT BED.

Local artist Gretchen Day shows her watercolors in distinct color combinations and soft lines. Mrs. Day's style is intriquing in regard to the two floral watercolors on display.

Lotte Zonnbenberg's unique watercolours are a sophisticated art expression.

Leaving this fascinating shop, the artist V. Morosan may be seen working outdoors along the streets of "old core" downtown Georgetown, as he creates in oils gorgeous scenes and historical building landmarks in our town.

This artist has made an great impression on the public as he is not only talented but also personable, with a stimulating ability to converse well with all people. Mr. Morosan came to Canada from Yugoslavia with a tremendous desire to become an artist. He studied in the United States, graduating as a commercial artist. After working for awhile in this field, he became a freelance professional artist.

Being versatile, Mr. Morosan uses the media of acrylic, watercolor, oils and pencil sketches. While painting in this area, the throb of community life surrounded him; people stop to tell him stories about
