Canada Day celebration happens this Saturday

Canada Day is Tuesday, July 1, but because so many people are holidaying Monday, two of Halton Hills' traditional Canada Day celebrations have switched to Saturday instead.

Canada Day in Glen Williams will be launched at 8:15 a.m. with a pancake breakfast in the ball park which will continue until noon. A pancake eating contest will be held between 9 and 9:45, also in the ball park.

At 10:30, there will be an atom ball game between Glen Williams and Acton, followed by a Canada Day Challenge Cup Tug-of-War between the 'Gold 'N' Bears and the Acton Bulldogs.

The parade starts at Mullen Place at noon and winds its way to the town hall. The opening ceremonies, featuring M.P. John McDermid, M.P.P. Julian Reed, Mayor Pete Pomeroy and councillors Russ Miller and George Maltby, will be held at 1:30 p.m.

A number of contests will be held between 1 and 3 p.m. including a pet show, a wheelbarrow race, an egg toss, a ladies' naildriving contest, a doughnut eating contest, watermelon seed spitting and balloon shaving.

Partners in Rhyme, a barbershop group, and the Mississauga City Sweet Adelines will entertain during the afternoon. There will be a beer garden from 1 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. and a chicken barbecue from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. The Pine Valley Squares will give a square dancing demonstration on the stage between 6 and 7:30 p.m. and the Sensation Jazz Band will entertain between 7:45 and 11:30 p.m.

The Jaycees will be launching their bicycle marathon to Ottawa from Glen Williams at 1 p.m.

A number of local organizations will be running concession stands to take the edge of hearty appetites. The Girl Guides will host a tea for senior citizens in the town hall.

The day's activities are being organized by Richard Nowina and a group of volunteers.

Bullinadad will also be holding their Canada Day celebration on July 1, beginning at noon with the judging of the best parade float, the best dressed pet and the best decorated bicycle, outside the hall.

The marshal for the day is Russ Miller and the judge is Erin councillor Jo Schneider. Sandra Henderson will be judging the pets.

At 12:30 p.m., the parade, led by the Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band, will head for Burnett's Field, which is on the town line, about 300 yards east of Trafalgar Road. The opening ceremonies will be conducted there once the parade has assembled.

There will be a men's and women's horseshoe tournament, and those wishing to participate must sign up by Friday at Shortill's store. The entry fee is \$3. There is also a mixed horseshoe tournament for teens aged 14 to 17.

There will be craft booths, and exhibits including rug hooking, stained glass and a "junkie shoppe". Contributions for the junkie shoppe can be given to Gerry Burgan, who lives on the 7th Line.

Races for the children will begin at 1:30 and continue through the afternoon. Fish ponds and other games for prizes will be running as well. This year for the first time, there will be a slow bicycle race, where the last person to cross the finish line without touching his or her feet to the ground wins.

MARATHON RACE
Runners of all ages will be able to compete in a marathon, five times around the field (twice around for children under 10). An obstacle course will be open to all comers during the afternoon.

A tug-of-war challenge match will be held at 4 p.m., and anyone can form a team during the day and sign up to compete.

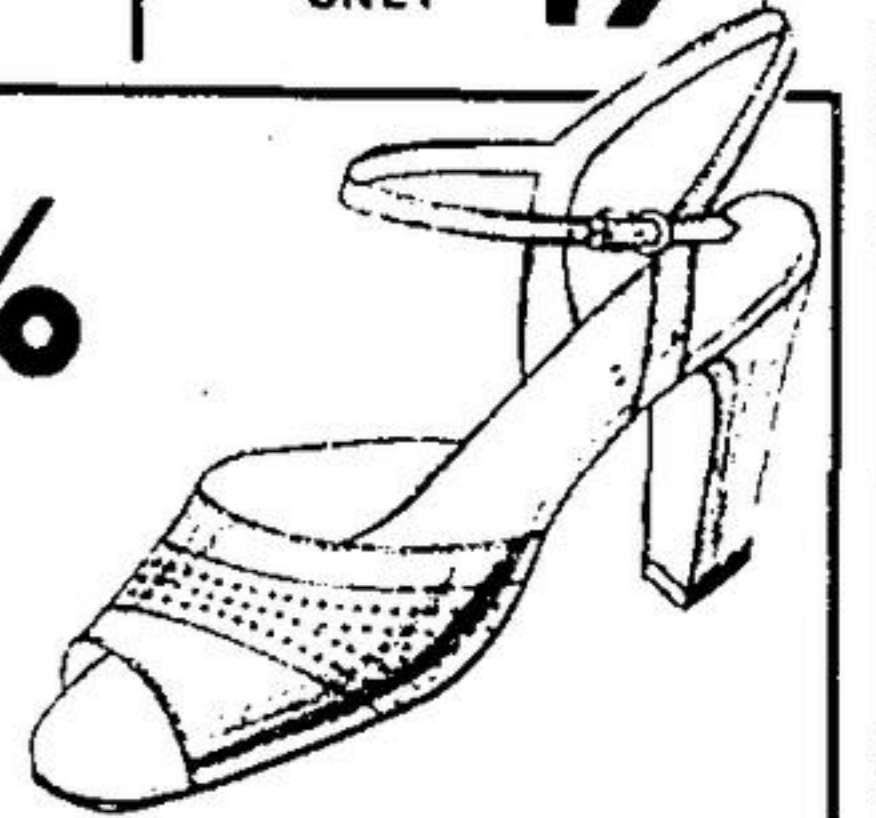

Lottery for old Acton hall

may already be pre-sold as a result of hints dropped by committee members during recent weeks.

"From comments I hear we may already have sold 400 to 500 tickets to people who said they wanted in when they overheard a committee member say we were planning a lottery," Mr. Tyler said.

The \$50,000 to \$60,000 raised by the lottery will be enough to meet the citizens' commitment towards restoring the red brick building at the corner of Bower and Willow Streets which has been threatened with demolition for two years.

The Ontario Heritage Foundation and Wintario will both make contributions to the project and town council has also pledged the amount it would have cost to raze the building towards its restoration instead if the citizens can raise a portion of the funds themselves.

The town originally intended to demolish the old building in favour of increased parking space for area one fire fighters. Community pressure forced a reversal of the decision and the building was instead tied to the second storey addition to the adjacent fire hall in 1978.

During that construction structural defects were discovered in the building and re-

storations costs jumped to \$236,000 to include repairs. Attempts to raise the money through pledges failed and council has extended its deadline twice in order to give the citizens time to find a workable fund-raising scheme to save the last of Acton's civic landmarks.
