Plenty of action

There was plenty of tournament action this week at the North Halton Golf and Country Club. Friday 131 National Hockey League (NHL) present and former players were on hand to help raise over \$4,000 for the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded. Saturday the finals of the week-long President's Cup tennis tournament wound up. On Monday the Bill Smith and 174 friends raised over \$7,000 for the cancer society.

Andy Bathgate shot a 75 to win the NHL event. The former hockey star, and now sports broadcaster, was pleased with the win. The week before in the American Airlines two-ball tournament, he and partner Harry Howell didn't do that well. They finished about the middle of the pack. The two said that their fareway shots weren't too bad but that their putting was off.

He could be commanding \$200,000 a year." Howell, who is now with the bright new Minnesota North Stars organization, agreed saying that although "it was a mistake to take the C off his jersey" he is still young enough to go a long way yet.

Few active players were entered in the tournament, probably due to the big airline tourney the week before. However Dale Tallon, now with the Calgary Flames, was there and he won the active players' competition against the likes of the Leafs' Roo Ellis and Philadelphia Flyers' Dave Gardiner.

Stacey Hurley and Rene March captured the President's Cup at the North Halton tennis tournament, winning four matches against some 20 other mixed doubles teams.

Hurley is maintaining her form she has used to make the 15-year-old half the national under 16 doubles champion. She is ranked number two in Ontario and number four in Canada, in the same age group, in singles play.

Bill Smith received a standing ovation Monday evening when he got up to present the traditional green jacket to Ed Astraukas, as winner of the cancer fund raising tournament.

This is the fourth year for the tourney and its best to date. His efforts to get it going deserve more than the applause he got and much more than can be said in words. The proper way would be to put in a donation in the name of his tournament.

A tip of the hat should also go this week to Ian Clark who ended a five year era at GDHS. Wednesday night the young runner received the Fokkens Award as the school's athlete of the year. One of his cross-country coaches, Donna Metcalfe, had trouble getting the words out when she spoke of his accomplishments and her association with the classy young gentleman.

He has helped build the Georgetown school into "the" powerhouse running secondary institution in this province. He led the teams to an unprecedented five team titles at the provincial finals this year, winning the 1,500 and 3,000 metre classes himself.

This year he moves to California where he will attend Berkeley University on a running scholarship. Good luck to you Ian.

A few words on Friday night's World Boxing Council welterweight championship fight between new champion Roberto Duran and former champ Sugar Ray Leonard.

I went to Montreal and caught the fight live. I got there just in time for the main bout, after leaving here at 3:30 the same afternoon.

Unfortunately I didn't get into Olympic Stadium for the actual fight. Somehow \$60 to sit probably 77,000 seats away from the ring for one fight was more than I could afford. I should have got tickets for the closed circuit in Toronto and Kitchener earlier but I didn't, hence my trip. Anyway I spent the few dollars I had in Old Montreal in the wee hours of the morning in Jacques Cartier Square. I did get in for the evening announcement.

As for the "Brawl in Montreal" the right man won. I saw the fight on a closed circuit television screen some 50 feet the other side of the Big O's glassed outside walls. It was plain to see that the new champ was always the aggressor. Sugar Ray layed back on the ropes many times and only occasionally did he come forth with his lightning quick flurry of punches. However he did manage to avoid many of Duran's blows.

It was a close fight and probably should have remained at a split decision as first announced rather than the unanimous decision that was later posted. It still remains a puzzle to me that a championship can be taken away in such a close fight. The win was not decisive the way a change in title should be. Duran was not a clear cut winner. If a rematch does take place, look for Leonard to regain his title with an early round knockout. A couple of times, in the 15 round distance fight, Duran was in trouble.

Clyde Gray who lost that same night to Sugar Ray's brother Roger, in the same weight class (147 pounds) would have lost even more easily had he been in the main bout. His glory days, when he fought for the title an unprecedented five times, are gone. He will probably retire now to his bricklaying business.

Canada's new boxing hopes are with Trevor Berbick who knocked out former WBC heavyweight champion John Tate in the ninth round just as I got there to see him do so. To knock out a champion is a feat all in its own, no matter who the champ was. George Chuvalo would agree.

Two sports schools

Summer recreation programs get government go ahead

Three summer recreation department projects have gotten the go ahead through grants received from Employment and Immigration Canada.

Working under the Summer Youth Employment Program, 14 local students will be involved in facelifts of some of Halton Hills' parks and recreation facilities, run a sport and fitness school and a gymnastics camp.

Four workers and one supervisor have already commenced work on the Parks Facility Improvements. Paul Thompson began supervising the efforts of crew members Dan Reynolds, Terry Richardson, Tom Tyan and Tom Wilcox on June 16.

They will continue throughout to August 29 repairing playground equipment, bleachers and player benches and backstop fences. They will also be painting, levelling and sand filling play areas and posting play area signs.

The grant covers the student wages only and all materials and supplies will come from the town.

The second grant received is to hire students to supervise Halton Hills' first Sports and Fitness School. This project is funded through Experience '80 and is a co-operative

program with the Halton Board of Education. It will begin operating the sports camps July 7 in both Georgetown and Acton, at the two high schools, for children seven years of age and up.

In August, for three weeks, the program becomes more specialized under the direction of GDHS teachers Mike McMahon and Bob McKay and will operate at GDHS only. The emphasis here is on more specific skill instruction through an option program and daily fitness.

Nancy Shortill is the supervisor of Lee Johnson, John Pritchard, Tony Saxon and Lori DeBruyn.

The third grant, also funded through Experience '80, is for a Gymnastic Camp. This camp will be held at the Rose Room, Memorial Arena Georgetown, and will run half days. It will offer such topics as gymnastic instruction on all Olympic apparatus, ballet, jazz, movies, swimming and special events.

Maureen McGowan is in charge of this group which includes Donna Horton, Terri Lamb and Kathy Krusch.
