Hunters education programs, offered at the Cold Creek Conservation area near Bolton. Next date are September 3, 5, 6 and 7. Keep them on your calendar and make arrangements now. Phone 661-6600, extension 288.

There are a few major changes in the hunting licences this year. Combined Ilcence for deer and bear is eliminated, and now you require a separate one for each.

The explry date of the 1960 spring bear licence is extended to December 31 for the transition period. A \$15 licence is required for deer but they must have an antier length of at least three inches (7.5 cm). You may obtain a tag for anterless deer at a cost of one dollar extra, to be affixed to your regular deer licence.

Archery taga will be an extra dollar to the deer licence. A tag is also available to affix to your small game licence to hunt racoon at night. This will cost \$5.

It will now cost \$50 to hunt fox. If you spotted the notice in last week's Herald, the Halton Region Conservation area has released a ten pound rainbow trout in the lake at Kelso and is offering a \$50 reward to the person who catches her. I have not heard whether or not the fish has been taken yet. If you can not get away this weekend, then why not head to Kelso and give it a try.

LOCAL FISH SPOTS A few other close-by areas for fishing and picnicing are Glen Haffey where they stock about 1,000, (yes, one thousand) trout each week. Terra Cotta still has a FEW trout left over from the stocking before the season opened on April 26.

Fairy Lake in Acton, as I have mentioned many times is good this year. You are almost assured of a few fish if you fish there with care. There are always pan fish for the kids and bass and pike for Dad and Mom. Don't be surprised if the youngsters get them all.

Scotch Block, near Milton is good for bass but they may close it to the public if there are further instances of rowdyism

The mouth of the Credit River, as well as Sixteen Mile creek, is good for bass and sometimes pike. You may just get a pickeral, an honest to goodness pickeral, not a walleye in the last two areas. They are a fresh water fish and can not stand pollution, something quite rare these days.

For those getting away up north or east for some of the newly opened bass, look for water temperature of 66-72 F. and you will have a better chance of hitting the bass. If you can find this temperature on points, near good cover close to deep water, then you have a hot spot.

Use a white Sassy Shad made up as a spinner bait at night. Try it before you knock it. I will be trying spinner baits along with Rapalas and Plastic Worms. Besides this I will be using my fly rod, and if the water is choppy then there will be a streamer on the tippet.

It takes a lot of words to describe "Flippin" as a technique, but it is worth it. I will try to get to this system soon, as it allows you to fish in the heaviest of brush. I have mentioned it here briefly, but will get to it in detail. Just remember that we are just getting into the best bass fishing of the year, at the beginning of the season. The temperature should be right and barring a storm front moving in, we should have a good fishing weekend in the ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
