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Blitz to curb vandals

The Halton board of education is preparing for a major blitz on vandalism in the board's 89 schools.

Board officials recently compiled a 57-page report on the problem which suggested possible ways of dealing with the situation. A spokesman from the board has said the copies of the report will be sent to schools, trustees, police and community agencies in an effort to encourage action by

these groups. Damage caused by vandalism in Halton schools cost the board of education \$144,000 in 1978 and \$132,000 last year. Damage in elementary schools in 1979 amounted to \$70,000 which while damage to secondary schools reached \$62,000.

The first step has already been taken in the fight. Schools are turning off all lights inside the school after dark because reports show vandals tend to stay away from blacked-out schools.

Other recommendations in the report include: increased emphasis on teaching of social responsibility and proper atti-tudes towards property and law in the classroom; attempts to avoid design of alcove hiding areas in schools, and the locating of students lounges where they can be well supervised by teachers; applying practical solutions to vandalprone areas, such as replacing frequently smashed windows with unbreakable glass.

The report recommends fast repairs of damage and obliteration of graffitti, because if students don't see the damage, they are less likely to resort to vandalism.

Vandals are usually boys between the ages of 14 and 17, and they don't regard themselves as criminals, the report says. Acts of mallclous damage are usually done in groups, after one person has issued a challenge to another member of the group.

Department aerial ladder cost \$192,000

The town's general committee has recommended approval for the fire department's choice of tender for an aerial

ladder and water tower. Four tenders were received Monday night by the department, with that of Superior Fire Trucks Ltd. of Kingston being deemed the most desirable, despite the fact it was not the lowest tender.

The tender came in at \$205,000, whereas the lowest tender was entered by C.E. Hickey and Sons Ltd. of Hamilton at \$191,867. Fire Chief Mick Holmes told

the committee that specifications drawn up by the department had been followed more closely in the chosen quote, to the advantage of the depart-He also pointed out that the lowest bidder did not have a

model to compare and build to the original specifications, and that to do so on such a large scale would be a first-time venture for them.

The winning bidder assured the fire department that its service would be available on a 24-hour basis. The town had allocated

\$190,000 for the equipment in this year's budget, leaving an anticipated shortfall of \$15,000. Chief Holmes noted that additional funds needed for the aerial ladder may be financed through municipal incentive

McDermid questions SIN abuse

Brampton-Georgetown MP John McDermid has been assured that Canada's privacy commissioner, Inger Hansen, will investigate allegations that the United Auto Workers Union is abusing the Social Insurance Number (SIN) system.

Mr. McDermid rose in the House of Commons during question period Monday afternoon and asked if the union is printing SIN numbers on its mailing labels. He asked treasury board president Donald Johnston to halt "this unauthorized and flagrant abuse of what is supposed to be a confidential number."
