

Trafalgar Rd. reconstruction awaits spring

Halton region's public works department has released a preliminary report on delays in the Trafalgar Road reconstruction project between Ashgrove and Stewarttown.

The report, made public at last Tuesday's public works committee meeting, said that work was suspended last November after a base coat of asphalt was laid by King Paving and Materials. Since that time, however, sections of the recent base coat, particularly at the northern end, have begun to break up under the heavy flow of gravel-laden dump trucks.

The preliminary report noted that granular material used in the reconstruction project was weakened by wet fall weather.

Although the granular material has since dried out, the works department is considering delaying the final coat of asphalt until next spring or summer because the contin-

uous traffic of dump trucks is not expected to end until later this year.

Works committee chairman Ron Planché of Oakville said he is embarrassed by the fact that construction on the road was started in 1979 and will not be finished until 1981.

Halton Hills Coun. Russ Miller said he is concerned that the "road will remain in its present shape until next year"; he likened the road to a "roller coaster ride" in some places.

Meanwhile, the works department has been patching parts of the road which have fallen into disrepair since the base coat was laid. The department's investigation has shown that sections of Trafalgar Road south of Ashgrove are also in need of strengthening particularly around the Hornby diversion north of Steeles Avenue.

The department is expected to submit its final results and recommendations stemming from the investigation later this month.

Wendy's menu includes hamburgers and cheeseburgers in one-quarter, one-half and three-quarter pound sizes, with a possible 256 variations in free condiments, hot chili, soft drinks, milk, iced tea, coffee, and shakes.

The Georgetown restaurant will be one of the first Wendy's restaurants to have a salad bar, which will feature eggs, vegetables and other salad foods.

Mr. Meads said he is looking forward to becoming a part of the community.

"We hope to have a good time here and contribute to the community as much as we can," he said.

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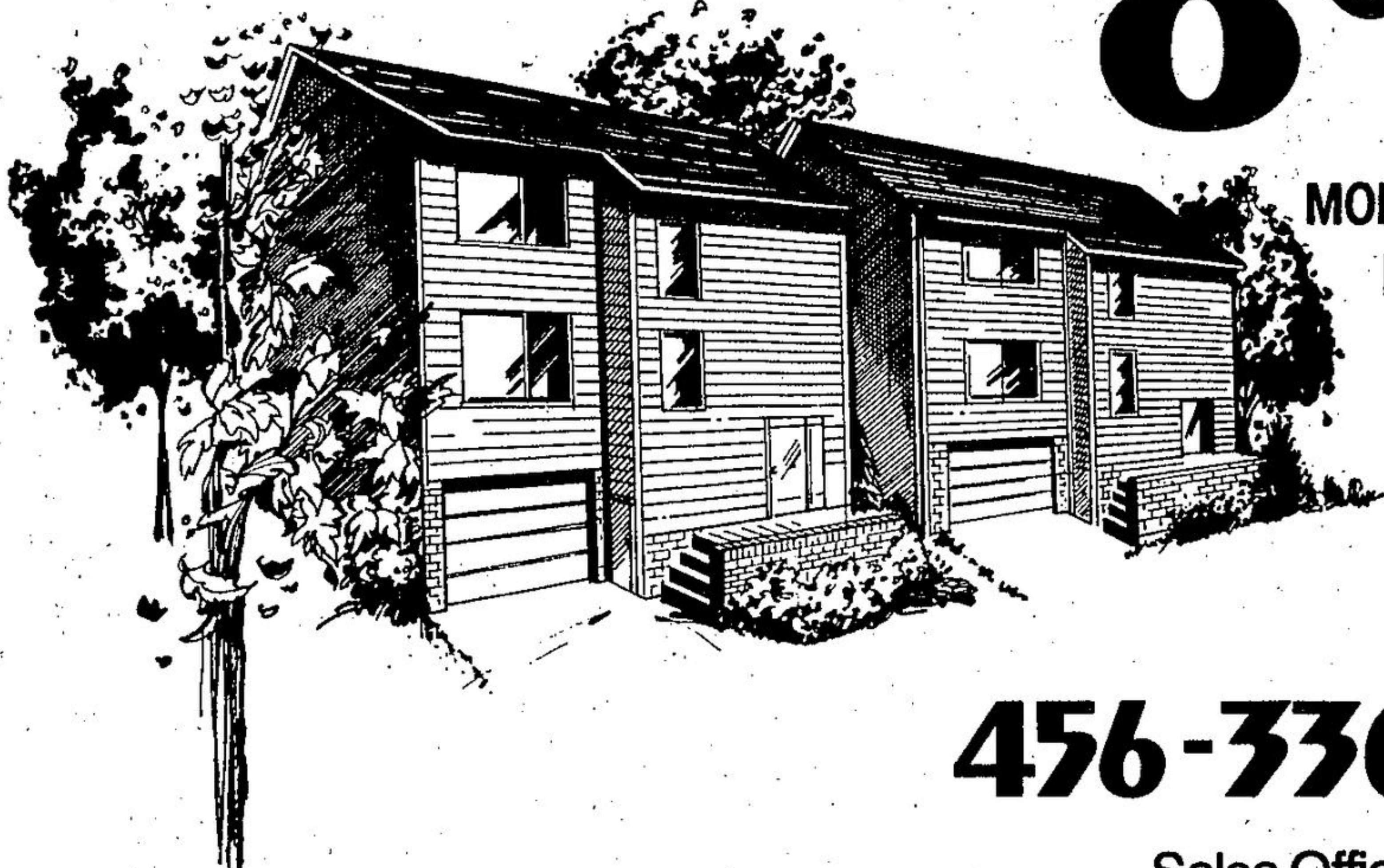
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
