QUESTION: You recently stated that a Hunter now requires a \$50 licence to hunt FOX. Is that true and why?
ANSWER: I can not print that which is untrue. The Ministry of Natural Resources news release dated June 13, 1980 was the source and the reason, I believe, is the high price on Fox pelts. With the market as high as it is, everyone would be out hunting fox.
QUESTION: The M.N.R. says there are only Small-mouth Blackbass in Fairy Lake in Action. They don't look like it to me.
ANSWER: Me either. There are only Largemouth Blackbass in Fairy Lake and I have fished that lake for 25 years. Never have I caught a Smallmouth there.
 The recent fishing derby at Burns Conservation area was a huge success. Five hundred trout were stocked and 150 caught. The largest fish both days of the derby were both 24 and a half inches long. As can be seen, there are still a lot of fish remaining, even though some have been caught since that date.

Many people did not believe me when I wrote in this column that there were large trout at Norval. Well here is the proof. They believed and went. Great fish, fellows.



RAPALA ANNIVERSARY
 This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Normark Corporation. Normark handles the famous Rapala lures and has come out with some new products to celebrate.
 Everyone loves the Rapala countdown lure and the jointed series. Now they are combined to give us the Jointed Rapala Countdown. Available in five colors and three sizes, it should be added to every tackle box, if the owner is serious about fishing.
 Another new item is the Super Swede Folding Knife. This knife has a three and three quarters inch Swedish surgical steel blade with a Rockwell hardness of C-57-59 for rugged use, edge retention and sharpening. Sounds to me like a winner, as are the other Swede Knives.
 Here we are halfway through July, and that usually means the start of the Salmon fishing in Lake Ontario. The move to stock Pacific Salmon in Lake Ontario back in 1969, created a "hot" fishery. The centre of activity is the Port Credit area and runs from there to St. Catharines and Niagara to the west and Scarborough on the east.
GREAT SALMON HUNT
 The Toronto Star has taken over the sponsorship of the GREAT SALMON HUNT that runs from August 16 to September 28 this year. Prizes will total \$130,000 in cash and merchandise making it the largest and richest fishing tournament in the world.
 First prize package is \$40,000 which makes the largest COHO caught worth about \$2,000 per pound. Big prizes also go to the largest Chinook, Rainbow, Brown and Lake trout.
 The Ministry of Industry and Tourism states that the future looks bright, now that the Sea Lamprey and "Indiscriminate gill nets" are under control.
 Look for a temperature range of 52-54 F (11-12 C) and troll at that depth. With about one hundred charter boats operating, there is lots of opportunity to fish, and the Ontario Charter Boat Association sets guidelines for its members. The rates runs from \$25 per man for four hours to about \$50. It is well worth it when you consider they provide all the tackle and the know-how, as well as a great boat ride. We will be keeping tabs on the fishery so keep an eye on ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
