## Mayfield Concept Plan

# Snelgrove pop. rising 14,000

Residential development to house 14,000 people and an 850 acre industrial park has been proposed as a blueprint for the future of the Snelgrove area.

Unveiled to Brampton and Caledon politicians and staff, residents and developers last Wednesday, the Snelgrove-Mayfield Concept Plan proposes 1,550 acres of low density residential land east of Highway 10.

Nine hundred acres which would house 8,370 people are in Caledon with the rest in Brampton which would accommodate 6,030 residents.

The industrial area is west of Highway 10 between 15 Sideroad and the Etobicoke Creek. Four hundred acres are in Caledon with the rest in Brampton.

Caledon is in particular need of additional serviced employment, and provide a more balanced residential and industrial-commercial assessment ratio.

Prepared by the Peel region planners, the plan, which will be studied by Caledon and Brampton staffs, pointed out the area is in a transition from rural uses to primarily urban uses.

That was attributed to its close proximity to Brampton's urban boundary, the area's accessibility via transportation routes and its partial inclusion within the northern limits of the South Peel Servicing Scheme.

The urban designations of the plan represent 10 per cent of the 24,000 acre Snelgrove-Mayfield Study Area which is bounded by Airport Road, 27 Sideroad, Mississauga Road and 15 Sideroad. The remaining 90 per cent should retain its existing agricultural designation, planners say.

## MPP spent \$24,200

Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed spent a total of \$24,233.52 in his role as an MPP this year.

Figures released at Queen's Park by House Speaker Jack Stokes at the close of the spring session show that Mr. Reed spent \$17,111.52 on his constituency office, \$2,928 on his legislative office and \$4,194 on accommodation and travel.

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
