Eight per cent raise ends contract talks

Members of the Halton Regional Police force have been awarded an eight per cent salary increase in an arbitration report issued last Wednesday.

Arbitrator Gail Brent awarded both uniformed and civilian personnel an increase of eight per cent. Ms. Brent established the salary increase by comparing the salaries of the Niagara, Hamilton, Wentworth, Durham and Peel Regional Police forces and establishing an average.

The raise, which is retroactive to January 1, will bring a first class constable's salary to \$23,447 from \$21,714. The association had requested a 15 per cent increase, while the commission's final offer in March when negotiations reached a stalemate was 7.5 per cent.

Ms. Brent turned down the association's request for the implementation of two-man patrols between 4 p.m. and 8

a.m. in certain areas. She recommended the association form a committee to study the future need for two-man patrols.

Employees will also now be given time and a half for overtime, instead of straight time, as was the case in previous contracts.

The settlement also puts cadets under the uniformed contract for the first time. Cadets had been part of the civilian contract.

Civilians have been granted an increased shift premium. This increase, the first since 1974, gives civilians an extra 17 cents an hour between 4 p.m. and midnight, and an extra 34 cents an hour between midnight and 8 a.m.

The commission's contribution to the dental plan has been increased to 75 per cent from 50 per cent. Other additional expenses which will be now covered by the commission include a clean-

ing allowance for uniformed civilians such as couriers and summons servers. Police officers have a cleaning allowance, but civilian personnel have never had such an allowance.

The salary award does not return Halton to the position of being the highest paid regional force in Ontario. That distinction belongs to the Hamilton-Wentworth force.

UW courses at library

Courses in developmental psychology, introductory social work, child abuse and the evolution of western civilization will be offered this fall and winter at the Acton public library by the University of Waterloo.

The introductory social work course will run Monday evenings. Instructor Allan Bross will survey current social work values, theories, methods and practice.

Charles Nienkirchen will lecture Tuesdays on the evolution of western civilization. He will trace western civilization from Rome in the second century to the present day.

Thursday evenings, a course in developmental psychology which may include topics such as early experience, perception, cognition, language and intelligence, will be offered.

Beginning in January, Dale Payne will lecture on child abuse on Monday evenings. The course will cover definitions and types of child abuse and neglect, the history and causes of the problem, and its impact on children, parents and communities. The second part of the course will deal with the techniques used in working with troubled children and families.

Fall courses will begin the week of September 8, and continue to the week of December 1.

Winter courses will be run from the week of January 5 to the week of March 30. These courses may be taken for a credit towards a degree, or attended as a series of free public lectures.
