

Maltby, Deforest shine as Hustlers clinch first with one game left

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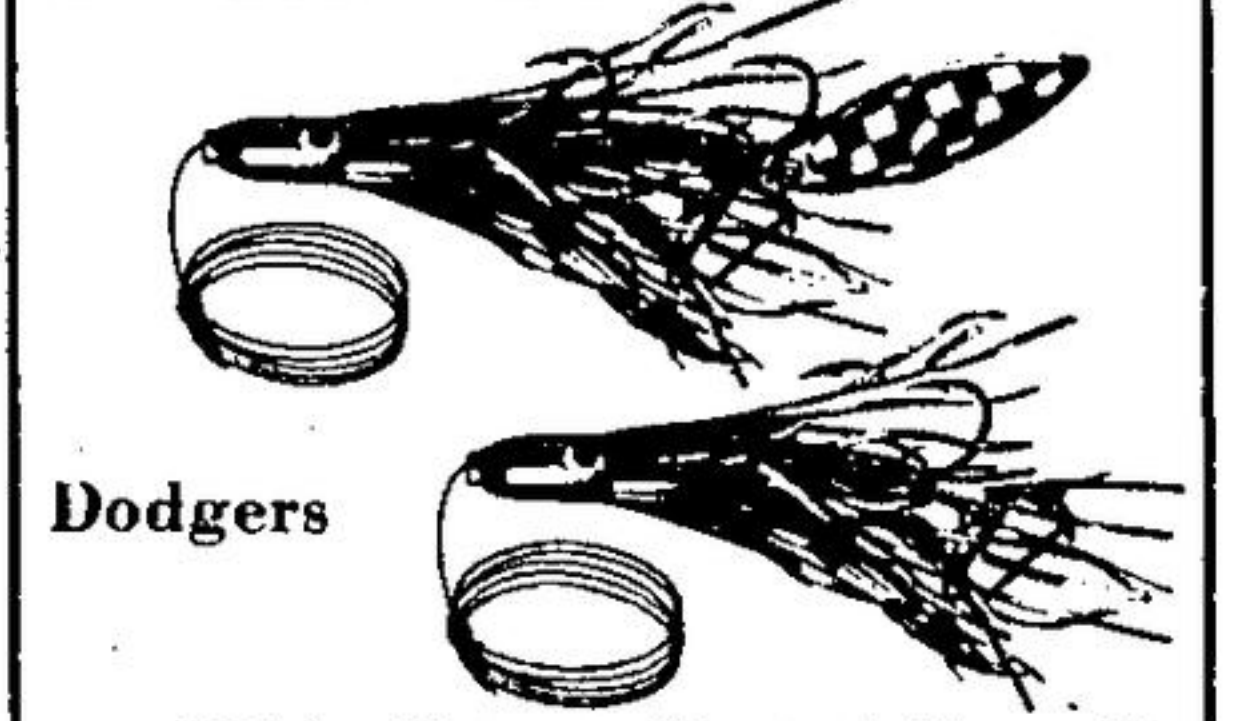
Ontario Outdoors

QUESTION: With all the talk of a fishing licence for Ontario, are these to be enforced soon? Clarence B., Georgetown.

ANSWER: Fishing licences are not presently required in Ontario, but they are a distinct possibility in the next couple of years. Seniors will be exempt and probably children under 12, and the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters want to make sure the moneys received from licence sales will be used solely for ANGLING.

QUESTION: While using a Dodger for SALMON how far back should I place the lure? Brian W., Hornby.

ANSWER: Presumably you want COHO Salmon. Set the lure six to 12 inches behind the dodger, unless you are using a plug. If so then don't use a dodger as the action destroys the action of the plug, unless of course you fish it at least four feet back. For Chinook, go 20 feet back from the cannonball to as much as 100 feet.



Still bothered by insects while out at the lake, or while fishing, swimming or hiking? In the spring I mentioned two excellent insect repellents in ONTARIO OUTDOORS. The one that I had not been able to test at that time was Deep Woods Off. This is not the familiar "OFF" that has been around so long. That is a waste of money so far as I am concerned. But Deep Woods is another story.

This is a very effective repellent, and I have used it in the woods and on the water while fishing. Deep Woods is on a par with "Ole Time" and Muskol as the three top insect repellents that are available to the outdoors person today. No offensive smell, not sticky, does not stain and lasts until you perspire it off.

As promised, the letters to our top politicians in Canada and the USA.

Hon. P.E. Trudeau, from the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters. "We believe very strongly that the time is overdue for you to get personally involved with trying to reduce acid rain. Both Mr. Robarits and Mr. Fraser have negotiated with the United States with no apparent success."

"President Carter's blatant disregard for Canada and our environment is proven by his decision to convert to coal fired generating stations. You must personally intervene if his decision is to be reversed. He must be persuaded to reduce acidic precipitation, not make it worse."

To Hon. Robert Kaplan, Solicitor General, from OFAH. "I am writing on behalf of our 19,400 members, to formally ask what steps you are taking toward amending the criminal code of Canada so that it is more acceptable to the honest firearms owners of Canada."

"On several occasions, our Federation has indicated what we feel needs to be changed. However, because you are relatively new in your current responsibilities, we wish to draw certain items to your attention. - We ask that you pursue these items and take appropriate action to make Canada's gun laws more acceptable to legitimate sportsmen."

Hon. J. Carter, from OFAH. "Your failure to reply to our letter of Oct. 31, 1979, and your planned conversion to coal fired generating stations, absolutely dismay us and many of our affiliates in the United States. Instead of reducing acid rain, you intend to make it worse. - It is not too late for you to take positive action. Please consider the environment and your people, as well as your neighbors in Canada."

Hon. Ronald Reagan, from OFAH. "Concerned people all around the world are trying to stop acid rain. US President Carter blatantly plans to increase it. We ask you to make the issue of acid rain a major one in your election campaign."

United States Media from OFAH. "It is time for all citizens of the United States to demand that their legislators stop acid rain."

I sincerely hope that the letters, that are briefed above will have an impact and that both the United States and Canada will know that there is an organization that is both sports minded and very much concerned about our environment.

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
