In the Atom league, the Bulls have bounced back in the last two weeks after being beaten by the top teams in the

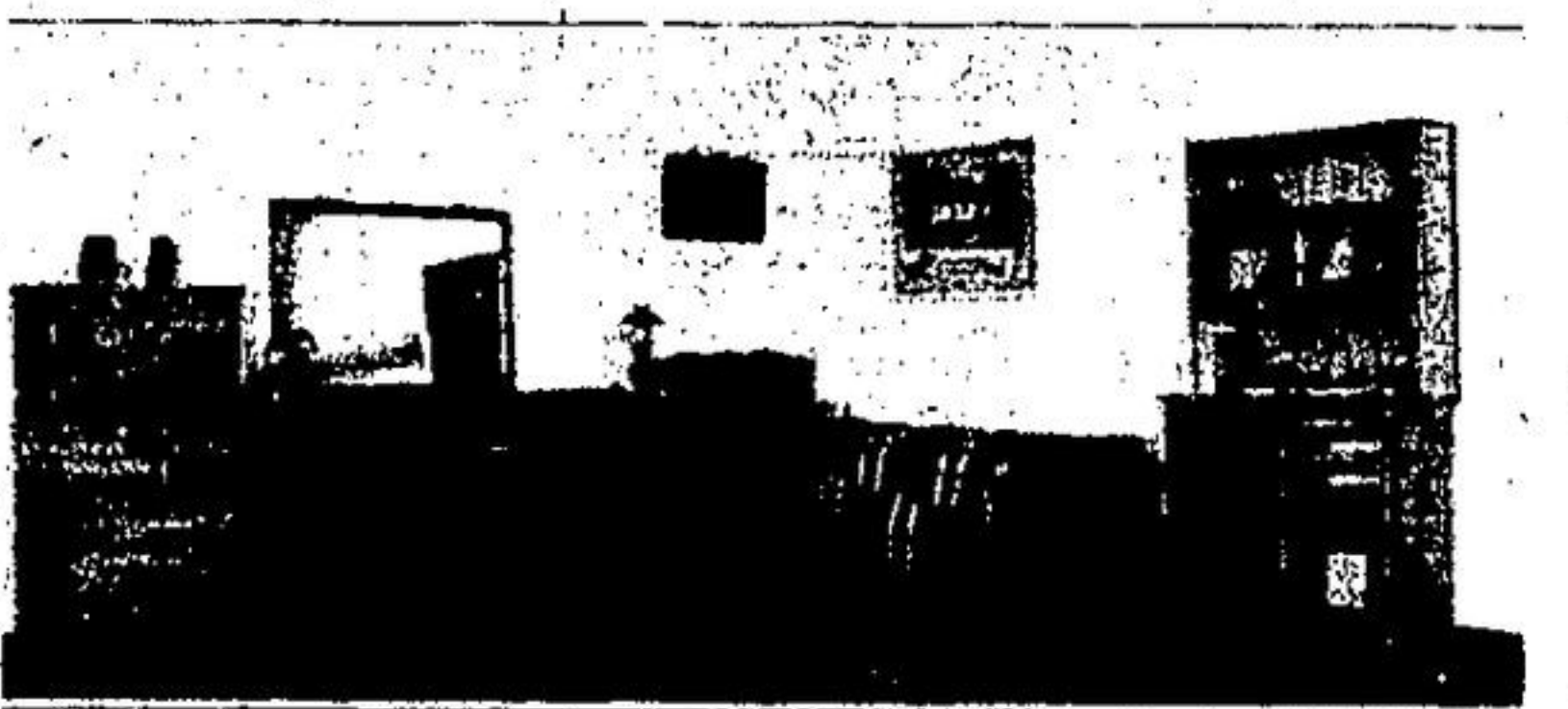
