Students, parents annoyed by local restaurant lay-offs

Georgetown's newly opened Wendy's restaurant has recently laid off ten of its 85 employees because of a drop in business following the rush opening, but some parents of students working there aren't happy with the way the situation was handled.

Robert Tunney told The Herald this week his daughter was laid off after buying a uniform for her job, and was told that there would be a delay of two weeks before she. would receive her severance pay an separation slip.

"Those kids are paying up to \$70 an outfit for their uniforms, and once they're laid off. they've spent that money for nothing," Mr. Tunney said. "My daughter was hired as a full-time employee and she had to go out and buy the slacks and the blouse and shoes, and now she's been laid

Craig Lenton, assistant manager at the restaurant, said that in his view, the purchase of a uniform is a risk an employee takes. He pointed out that in many factories, safety boots are required and the employee must purchase them at his own expense, running the risk of getting laid

"I can understand the parents getting upset about the uniform thing, but it's part of a business," Mr. Lenton sald.
